Sawdust Famine Faces Lucknow, But Ratcliff Stockpile Holds Up

During and immediately follow- the club. ing the war, when fuel supplies of coal, wood and oil were uncertain, many Lucknowites installed sawdust burners in homes and business places, and found sawdust a satisfactory and very economical heating subsitute. With the Lucknow Sawmill working night and day, the year-round, the sawdust supply was ample to meet local demands.

But, in December the Sawmill closed down for the winter, and since then the monster stock pile weeks Lucknowites have been scouring the countryside in search of sawdust but have found it to be a surprisingly scarce commodity. Some is being obtained at Listowel, with truckers sitting waiting for the freshly sawed product as it comes from the mill.

Some sawdust users are making other heating arrangements, such as installing oil burners or reverting their furnaces to burn coal or wood.

Mr. Don Ratcliff informs The Tribune that he finds sawdust for fuel ideal, and by making the summer cut with winter moisture in the latter cut tends to distribute through the summer sawdust to good advantage for burning.
