Prosecuted for Cutting Small Trees in Darlington Township

Peter Proskin of Darlington township pleaded guilty before Magistrate Baxter for cutting maple, oak, elm, beech and pine trees having a diameter of less than ten inches, contrary to the provisions of By-law No. 1553 of the United Counties of Northumberland and Durham. The charge was laid by Mr. Howard Millson, who was recently appointed Tree Commissioner for Durham County. The by-law was passed in 1947 in the interests of conservation to restrict unlimited cutting of young trees. Mr. A.W.S. Greer, K.C., of Oshawa, represented the accused and Mr. Alan Field, Cobourg, represented the United Counties.

In York County such trees may not be cut having a diameter of less than 14 inches.
