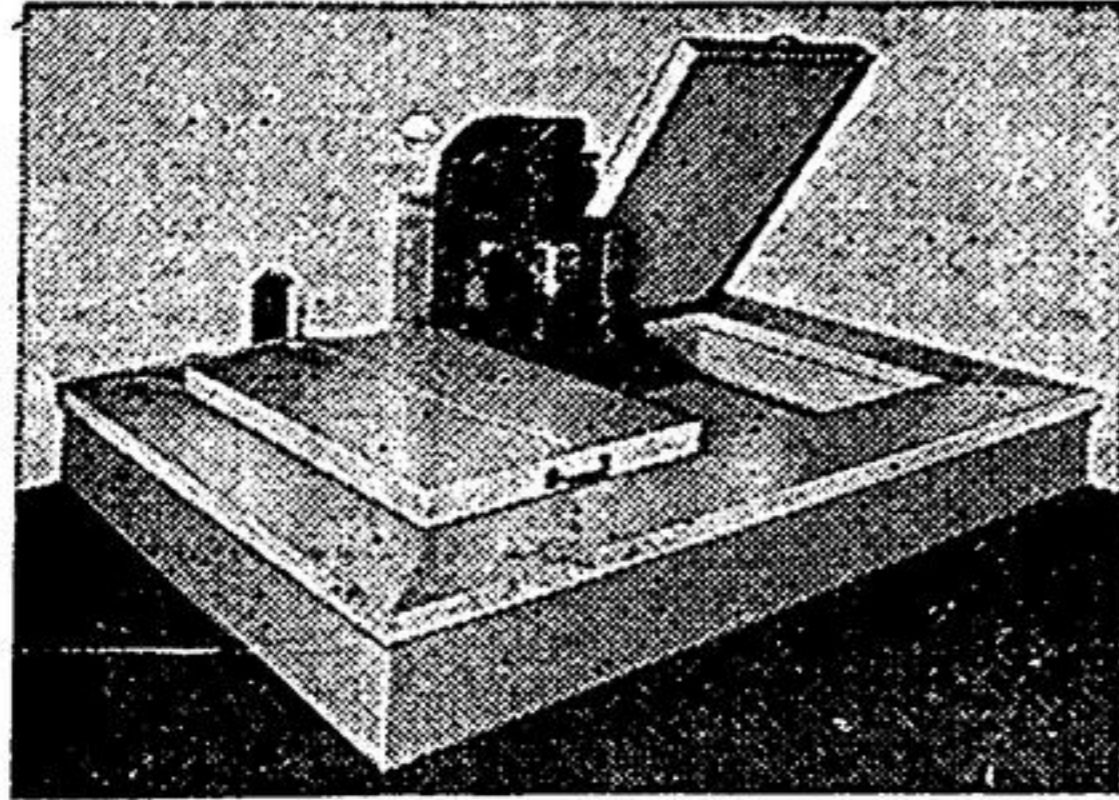

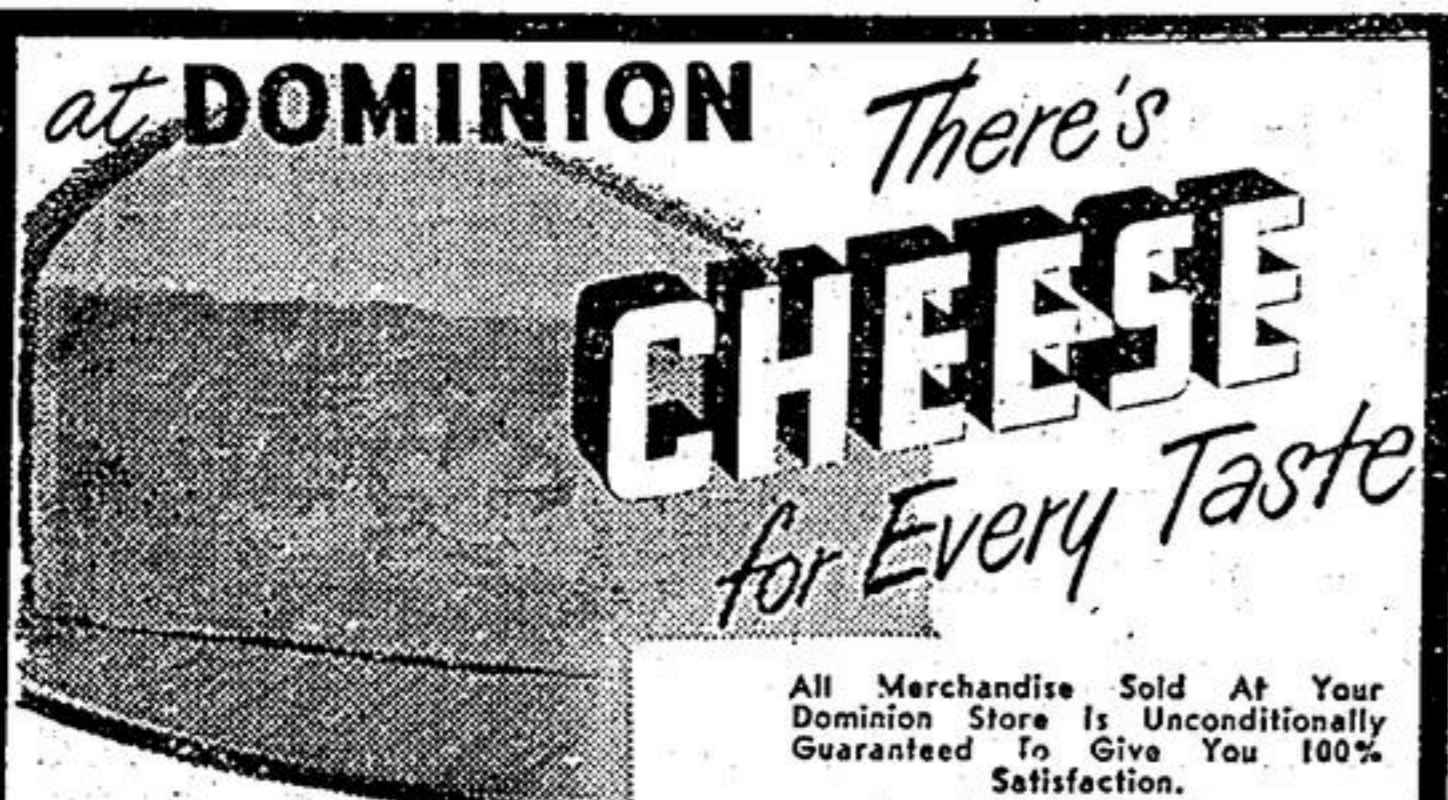
Our township road maintainer is under repairs. Seems a very awkward time to be without the machine when many roads are blocked.
