

Jack L. Schmidt of New Dundee near Kitchener is in possession of a rare pipe brought to Canada from Germany 47 years ago by his grandfather, Henry Schmidt. A native of Germany, his grandfather came to this country as a child of three years, returning to the land of his birth for a visit in

It was on that trip that the new pipe was purchased. It was commonly used by gentlemen who enjoyed a leisurely smoke. Because of its size, it was not handy to carry around.

The pipe is made of wood and fashioned in three sections which when screwed together for use measures 40 inches in length. It has a white porcelain bowl attached to the base which will hold half the contents of a package of tobacco. It is also covered with a spark screen. The pipe has a flexible stem.

It was manufactured by Wilhelm Imhoff at Cassel, Germany, and carries a stamp, the English translation of which is "each of these pipes must bear my trade mark."
