Put all these things together and they spell out a "New School" or at least an addition to what we already have. A school area would remedy all these things not only for our community but for surrounding communities also.



The Canadian Deserts

Fred Ohi, Grade XIII I think that some of the land in the Vivian district should be used more efficiently. Only ten per cent of the cleared land is suitable for agricultural purposes. This region is sandy, therefore left in sod. In hot days of the summer, however, the grass is scorched, making it useless for most purposes except starting grass fires. It is land which can be used for growing agricultural products if irrigated. As the cost of such a project would be prohibitive, this sandy region, where unused, should be reforested with government trees planted by the occupant. This may take a few years for a possessor with large tracts of land, but in time such an undertaking would pay. If properly cared for, the woodlot would be self-regenerative, a legacy for many generations to come.

There is reforestation done by the Department of Lands and Forests, but this department cannot reforest the large areas of denuded land in Canada.

Woodlands and reforested areas are natural reservoirs which provide water for springs and wells. Areas which have been stripped of their covering of trees have suffered a drop in the water level of the soil, resulting in drying wells and springs.

The area at Vivian has a light, rolling countryside covered with grass. In this area, the heavy rain of a storm washes away some of the vegetation. This leads to erosion and abandonment of farms. These rolling sections can only be successfully used for forest growing.

An illustration of a ruined piece of land is on the eighth concession. You have seen this place each time your car has travelled on this road, but the sight may not have made a very deep impression. Some of the soil was taken out for some reason which I do not know. The ground was left exposed to the effects of the rain and wind. Among the deep gullies which criss-cross this piece of land are some patches of grass, the remnants of a once fertile field. Before long the owner should reforest his property with suitable trees to check further deterioration of the agricultural value of the land.

Because of the lack of trees, some areas are slowly drying. The annual rainfall is decreasing. If something is not done soon to supplement this lack of trees, these areas may soon end up as a drifting desert of sand.
