GEESE ARE GUESTS, EAT UP CROPS WARDENS TOLD, "GET THEM OUT!"

Game wardens on Friday were trying to disperse more than 2,000 hungry Canada geese from the Cobden area 60 miles west of Ottawa.

The geese consisted of more than half a flight of 4,000 which had made a stopover. For a time they had been fed by game wardens.

However, they ran through \$550 worth of feed—all that was available—and then started to work on neighboring crops.

The Ontario Department of Lands and Forests then ordered the wardens to get the geese out of the area.

The Pembroke Fish and Game Association may send a delegation to Toronto to get a stay of sentence for the birds.

ALBERTA HUTTERITES HEAD FOR MEXICO

A group of 23 Hutterites, advance agents of 450 others, left MacLeod, Alta., last week by truck for Mexico.

The Hutterite group will negotiate for land for five colonies of the religious sect who came to Alberta from South Dakota and Manitoba in 1948.

The party will investigate land possibilities in the Chihuahua district, about 250 miles southeast of Sonora, where another advance Hutterite group is exploring opportunities for settlement.

A spokesman said the proposed move was influenced by a desire for expansion, fear of future war and religious reasons. Although they said they had been treated fairly by the Alberta government, they felt they were not wanted there.

Adjourn Liquor Hearing For More Evidence

Jointly charged with having liquor illegally and having liquor in an illegal place Roy and Dorothy Blackburn of Goodwood were remanded until May 4, for further evidence to be presented at that time, when they appeared before Magistrate Frank S. Ebbs in Magistrate's Court in Uxbridge last week. Mr. Blackburn pleaded not guilty to both counts while Mrs. Blackburn pleaded not guilty to the first charge, but guilty to the second. At the request of the bench she withdrew her plea until next week.

Provincial Constable Gordon Keast testified that on the evening of April 7 he saw a car parked on Brock Road facing north, near the No. 47 Highway intersection, with Mrs. Blackburn behind the wheel. "I asked her to move her car," said the O.P.P. "Next time I saw the car travelling down the road, there were three people in it, Mr. and Mrs. Blackburn and Jack Beach, of Goodwood."

The officer said when he halted the car he found three broken bottles of beer in the back of the vehicle and said the accused man had a cut on his hand.

"Mrs. Blackburn was quite upset and started crying," testified Constable Keast.

Mrs. Blackburn told the court it was probably the motion of the car broke the bottles, when they rolled together. "As for my crying," she said, "it was rather windy there and it may have got in my eyes." This brought snickers of laughter from the crowded courtroom.

Both accused stated the beer was

bought in Toronto four weeks previous to their arrest. "I purchased it from a store two blocks past Woodbine off Danforth Ave.," said Mrs. Blackburn.

Crown Attorney Alex C. Hall K.C., requested the hearing be adjourned until the manager of the store could be summoned to court.

"If the constable hadn't acted so fast," declared the accused man, "and not opened the door, grabbing the beer bottles he could have searched the car and found a whole case in the trunk compartment." Mr. Blackburn said it was all part of the beer bought by his wife in Toronto.

OTTAWA LETTER

Last week the usual decorum of the House of Commons was disturbed by the presence of some half dozen communists who attempted to speak to the members from the public gallery. Visitors in the gallery of the House of Commons must always observe strict silence and are not allowed to applaud or in any way show approval or disapproval of the proceedings. You can imagine the surprise of all last Thursday when just before the Speaker's call to order a loud voice broke out in the gallery. As one disturber was ushered out another took up the line and so on until a half dozen were removed. The disturbers were members of the Communist organization which held a meeting in Ottawa that day.

Such incidents are very rare in the history of the Canadian Parliament. Members of the Protective staff recall that it was 26 years ago a disturber had to be removed from the gallery by force. The late R. B. Bennett was in the midst of one of his heated orations when loud cries of "Repent," "Repent" were heard in the gallery. The offender was known as a character about town who shortly afterwards was taken to a mental hospital.

Contest Winner from North York We had the pleasure and honour this week of entertaining in Ottawa Allen Jackson of Newmarket. Allan, age 16, was the first prize winner in an essay contest sponsored by the Canadian Legion open to all secondary school students in Ontario. The essay subject was "My Idea of Canadian Citizenship" and there were more than 3000 contestants. The prize for four prize winners was a two day all expense trip to this capital city. We had the privilege of entertaining Allan to lunch in the Parliamentary Restaurant and showing him around the Parliament Buildings.

We had a visit with the Prime Minister who gave a short but impressive talk on citizenship to the young people. Other prize winners who accompanied Allan on the Ottawa trip were Anne Cobra of Conniston, Barbara Boos of Kitchener and David Proux of Midland.

Rural Mailmen

Among the public servants of rural Canada none is more faithful or more highly regarded than the rural mailmen. Day after day in all kinds of weather he renders an important and appreciated service to the people. Many of these men who deliver the mail have long records of public service.

In North York the long service is held by Edmund Groves who commenced service on Schomberg R.R.2 on the first of April, 1929.

Frank G. Gamrill commenced service to boxholders in King R.R.3 on December 1st, 1920, and Ernest Cummins, King R.R.2 has been delivering the mail since July 14, 1924.

On May 18th next, "Billy" King will have completed a quarter century of service as the contractor for Keswick R.R.1. To all these and other mailmen our congratulations and good wishes.

I receive many enquiries regarding Mr. MacKenzie King's health and am pleased to report that he is progressing favorably.
