Mr. Carruthers enclosed a clipping from the Los Angeles Times telling of the great pea harvest at Oxnard, Cal. In this section, our local resident writes, the land is not for sale, even at \$400 an acre. A thousand acres of peas are being harvested within a radius of six miles of Oxnard. The operations go on 24 hours a day, and will take three to four weeks to complete. Before the introduction of peas to this California area, the farmers let their acreage lay idle before bean planting. Now they have a quick second crop. Processing and freezing of the peas is under way 16 hours a day, and will produce more than 3,000,000 pounds.
