Aboard USAT General J. H. Mc-Rae—This United States Army Transport, one of 36 ships charter-ed by the International Refugee organization, is bound for Bremerhaven, Germany, to take on another thousand or more displaced persons to be resettled in the United States.

Listening to IRO officials and others, I have learned more about the migration miracle.

One interesting source of information is J. A. Swettenham of the British Foreign Office, attached to the Maintenance Branch, Land Commissioner's office, Hanover. major of former Royal Engineers spent four years with the Control Commission for Germany. He is returning to his post after having arranged for publication in New York of a book entitled "The Case for DPs".



Forgotten Curfew for Children Under Sixteen **Dusted Off in Lindsay**

That forgotten curfew law, for children under sixteen, well-known in local towns and villages forty years ago, has been dusted off in Lindsay and ready for use again.

Chief Webster says the matter of children who are out at night in public places has been drawn to the attention of police authorities and Mr. L. W. Jordan, Crown Attorney, has instructed that the section of the Children's Protection Act, which applies, be enforc-

Complaints received are that children under the age of 16 years are apparently visiting not only restaurants, places of amusements, which of course includes dance halls within the Municipality of Lindsay, but also outside of town.

Section 16 of the Children's Protection Act deals with children being out at night and the interpretation section of this Act states that a child means a boy or girl actually or apparently under the age of 16 years. Section 16 of the Act provides that no child shall loiter in any public place at 9 p.m. or be in any place of public resort or entertainment after that hour unless accompanied by parent or a guardian or adult.

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
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
