Claremont Suspects Elect Trial by Judge

June 28 next was set as the date for hearing of charges against William and Henry Kostinchuk and John Winter of Toronto, charged with breaking and entering the Claremont Co-operative last October. In court Henry did not appear. Unofficially it was learned that he is under sentence at St. Vincent de Paul in Quebec.
A grand jury previously had a true bill against these three men. Now they have elected trial by judge without jury. R. D. Rudy is their counsel. Bail was renewed.

Fleeing Youths with Pistol Captured at Musselman's Lake

A pair of black rubber boots with red soles, led to the arrest for the second time of 20-year-old Charles McIntosh, no fixed address. A few months ago he stole a quantity of articles of clothing from a farm where he was employed, including a pair of rubber boots. He was caught but the farmer dropped the charges against him after he returned the clothes but with the farmer's permission, kept the rubber boots.

Last week Charles McIntosh and Dick Long, 16, of Uxbridge, appeared before Magistrate Frank S. Ebbs in Magistrate's Court in Uxbridge, both charged with being armed with a pistol with intent to break and enter the Uxbridge Public School. Both pleaded guilty and were remanded, in custody, one week for sentence.

Provincial Constable Victor Proctor said he received a telephone call last month from the principal of the public school complaining of a break-in.

"I investigated and found the screen on the north window had been torn," stated Constable Proctor. "I went up the fire escape to the second window and found it had been forced." The officer told the court he saw indentations on the ground of a pair of large rubber boots. He said he was informed Long and McIntosh had been seen together the previous night and a check with Long's parents, who thought their son was at school, showed he had not been there all morning.

The officer stated they finally caught the fleeing youths on a park bench at Musselman's Lake, north of Stouffville. "As I approached them I saw McIntosh unload a .22 calibre pistol and throw it on the ground. They had 50 rounds of ammunition for the weapon."

"This whole thing is my fault," burst out McIntosh in court. "If I hadn't suggested it to Dick he wouldn't have gotten into this trouble. He only pleaded guilty because I did."

"When did you two first get to know each other?" queried the bench.
"We met in Sunday School about three years ago," was the reply.
"I hope you didn't take those things with you," said Magistrate Ebbs, pointing to a cardboard box containing two guns and several other articles.

Constable Proctor said, when he apprehended the two accused, they told him they had broken into a cottage on the north side of the lake and slept there all night. "They had clothing and several other articles with them, they had taken from the cottage," testified the officer.

Along with the .22 calibre pistol, carried by McIntosh, was a .32 calibre nickel plated Smith and Wesson revolver displayed as evidence. Constable Proctor said the weapon had been taken from Long last March when he showed up at school with it. Last week the youth said it belonged to his father. The revolver was unregistered.

It was pointed out that the McIntosh youth had held down several jobs in various places about Ontario, one of which was secured for him a few months back by Provincial Constable Gordon Keast. McIntosh's mother resides in Toronto. His father has been dead for some years.

In court McIntosh was wearing the same rubber boots through which Provincial Constable Proctor was able to trace his footprints. The boots are identical with the pair he stole from the farmer a few months back, but was allowed to keep.

On display as evidence was the loot taken from the cottage by the two youths, who claimed they "never got into the school."
