**OTTAWA LETTER**

Communism has been very much to the fore in discussions in Parliament this week. Naturally, Communism has no friends here but there is a great difference of opinion as to the most effective means of combating the evil in this country.

The debate was started by Mr. Drew who moved that appropriate legislation be introduced so that communist and similar activities in Canada be made an offence punishable under the criminal code. In support of his resolution Mr. Drew made an excellent speech as the leader of the opposition. Never is he in better form than when he is on the subject of communism.

The Prime Minister who was Minister of Justice at the time of the spy investigation here also made a notable speech on the subject observing that he did not think there are many Canadians who do not realize there is an ideological warfare going on and that there has been for a number of years a conflict between Communism and Christian civilization. It is a matter of opinion he said as to what are the best methods to be adopted to prevent the spread of communism in our country. I am firmly convinced however he said that it has diminished over the last few years.

The Prime Minister pretty well summed up the majority opinion here when he said "for my part I have been preaching that the best method of combating communism is to make democracy work as a system benefitting no particular classes or groups, but benefitting all members of our population. There will be little danger of the spread of communism if all our people realize that it is the desire of those representing the majority of the people in Canada to have laws that enable each to get a fair share of the welfare which Providence makes it possible to provide for everyone in this country."

**Trans-Canada Highway**  
The signing of agreements by the Federal Government with the Provincial Governments for the construction of a Trans-Canada highway was an historic event.

An all-Canada highway from coast to coast has long been a dream of Canadians which now is nearing realization. The road at completion will be 5,000 miles in length and the estimated cost is three hundred million dollars.

The work will be done by the various provinces, but the Federal government will pay one half of the cost. While agreements have been signed with only six provinces there is general understanding with the others and it is felt it is only a matter of time until all the provinces co-operate in the project.

**Human Rights**  
Over a period of years considerable has been heard in Canada on the need for a Canadian Bill of Rights. With this in mind a special committee of the Senate is now sitting and making an extensive study of the whole question of human rights and fundamental freedoms.

The Committee is asked to bring in a report outlining what are the human rights and fundamental freedoms every Canadian should have, how they may be protected and preserved and what action if

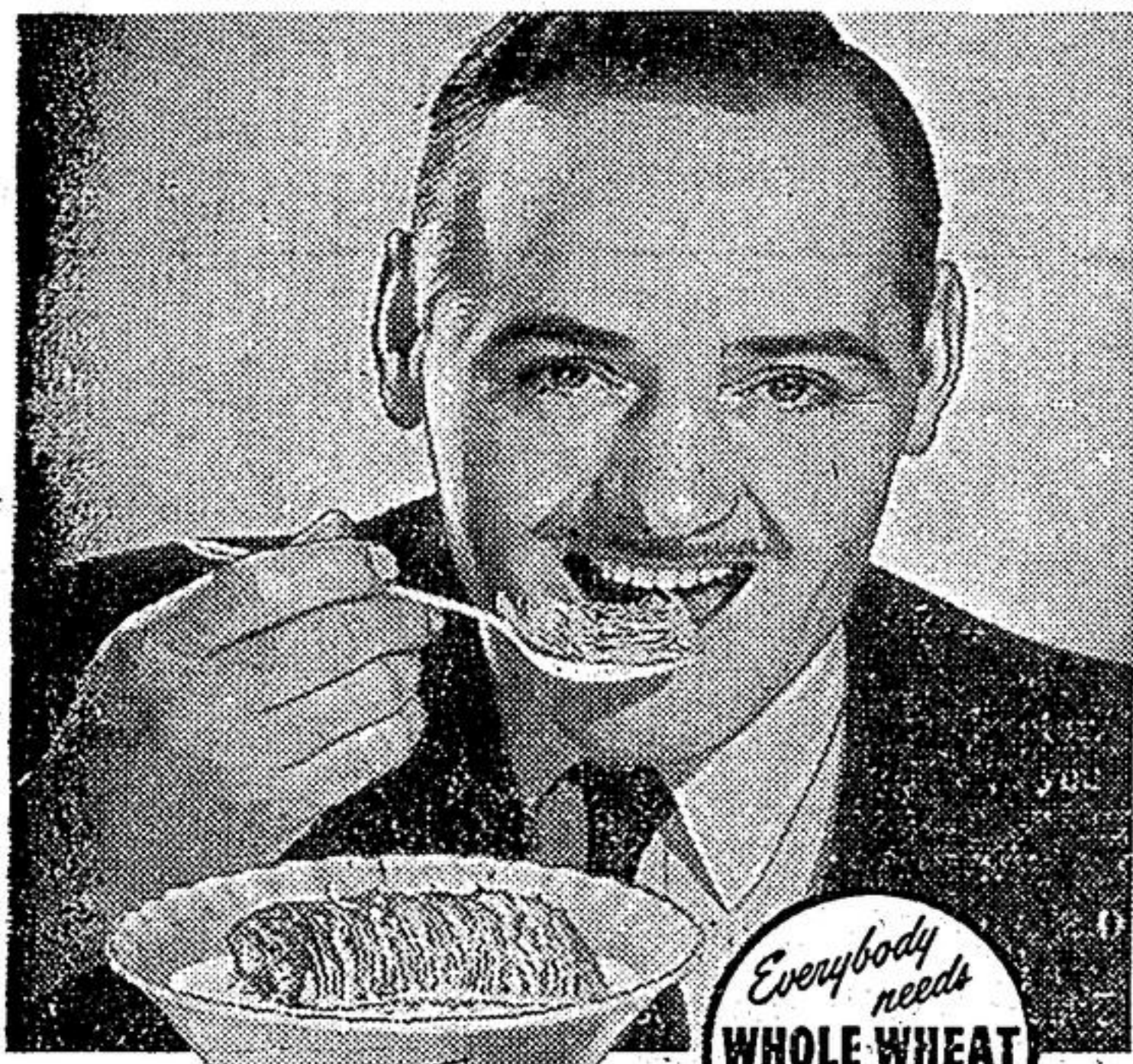
**DATE-ORANGE PUDDING**

Combine in a greased casserole (6-cup size) ¼ c. corn syrup, 1 tbs. grated lemon rind and ½ c. orange juice. Mix and sift once, then sift into a bowl, 1½ c. once-sifted pastry flour (or 1½ c. once-sifted hard-wheat flour), 2½ tps. Magic Baking Powder, ½ tsp. salt and ¼ c. fine granulated sugar. Mix in ¾ c. corn flakes, slightly crushed, and ½ c. cut-up pitted dates. Combine 1 well-beaten egg, ½ c. milk, ½ tsp. vanilla and 3 tbs. shortening, melted. Make a well in dry ingredients and add liquids; mix lightly. Turn into prepared dish. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, about 40 minutes. Serve warm, with pouring cream. Yield—6 servings.

**Struck Officer, Gets Two Months**

"It's a one-man revolution against Canada," said Crown Attorney Alex. Hall in Uxbridge court Thursday, "when a man attacks a police officer in the execution of his duties."

Magistrate Ebbs agreed and imposed a two-month sentence on Alan Stewart, 25, of Uxbridge who admitted assaulting Police Chief James Swinson on April 29. Pleading guilty to a second charge of being intoxicated, Stewart was fined \$10 and costs or 10 days concurrent.

Chief Swinson told the court he saw accused narrowly missed by two cars as he staggered along the street.

"I asked him if he was trying to kill himself and he struck my throat so hard that I could hardly breathe," the officer said. "While he was swinging punches at me I rapped him a couple of times with
