### Last Posted Sounded For Veteran of 2 Wars

Memorial service for Capt. Walter E. Gillion who died in Wellesley Hospital early on Saturday, was held in the funeral chapel of McDougall & Brown, St. Clair Ave., Toronto, on Tuesday, at 3 p.m.



Although only in his 51st year Capt. Gillion was a veteran of two World Wars, serving under Col. Arnold in the 15th Battery Artillery in the first war, acting after the armistice for a number of years as Treasurer of the Gunners' Association.

When the last war was declared Capt Gillion was appointed director of the training of the members of various new Batteries. Genial, friendly and kind hearted, his work as secretary for the Artillery Welfare Fund where his thoughtful efficiency relieved many a critical situation, was carried on until his ill-health brought it to a close. This high standard of life made him many friends and his brother officers have nothing but kind words of regret and approval to say of him. His illness which lasted several months was borne with all a soldier's fortitude.

He was the beloved son of Mrs. Mary Gillion who has resided in Stouffville for the last five years, and for whom he cherished great affection. His father, John Gillion, predeceased him many years.

Mrs. Mary Gillion's many friends and relatives in Stouffville and the surrounding district sympathize with her in the loss of a kind and loving son.

Survivors are his wife, one son Donald, one daughter Mrs. Marie Hassack, an older brother Wellington, a sister Mrs. Cora Heppburn, and a younger (adopted) brother William who is also a veteran and at present under hospital care at Sunnybrook. All reside in Toronto.

Interment took place at Prospect Cemetery, entire service being conducted with full military honours.
