Centennial at
Sharon June 24th**

Arrangements for the public celebration of the centennial of the municipal County of York at Sharon Temple Park on Saturday, June 24th, are being made by a special committee of York County Council of which Deputy-Reeve N. G. S. Ingram of North York Township is chairman in association with the York Pioneer and Historical Society of which Major J. C. Boylen is president. The occasion will be a gathering of York County Council members and their friends, members of local municipal councils and officials and also former councillors and their descendants. The outing at the park of the Temple of Peace will take the form of a basket picnic and hot water will be supplied for tea. Aurora Boys' Band will be in attendance. The program will include brief speeches as well as games and other events. The Temple, begun in 1825 and now a museum, had been a meeting place for over twenty years when Hon. Robert Baldwin, the legislative father of municipal government, used to meet his supporters in Sharon. The village was one of the important centres in "the fourth riding of York," which was represented by Baldwin in the old parliament of Canada.

ing characters were Americans though. This little outing was made possible by a mutual arrangement with another couple on the boat. They went the first night and we minded their little girl.... the second night they reciprocated and Doris and I went up to the bright (?) lights.

Time marched on, and soon we were on our way out of the harbour and rounding the Northern "land's end" of New Zealand for a turn due East toward Australia. The Tasman sea has a reputation for being a rough customer, and most everybody on board had attended to their last-minute packing before docking at Auckland. For this once, it seemed, we were favoured with an exceptionally calm crossing. One day out of Sydney, we were speeded up a bit by a tail wind, which however didn't make the water noticeably rougher. The result was that we woke up next morning to find that we had entered the heads of Sydney harbour away ahead of schedule. All the things the Sydneysites say about their harbour and their "bridge" is truly authentic. I must say the scene, even in early morning in the rain, was magnificent.

At Auckland, we had filled up with Australians returning from vacation or business trips to New Zealand. So the majority of passengers were now returning Aussies, including the personnel of the boat. All across the Tasman sea, there was pleasant controversy between the folks from Sydney and those from Melbourne, as to the merits (and demerits) of their respective cities. The Melbourneites had the last laugh this time, as, contrary to everyone's expectations sunny Sydney was beclouded, misty and the first rain in weeks made picture-taking almost impossible. Speaking of weather, when we landed in Sydney, we didn't realize for 3 days how very lucky we were that the Aorangi came through on schedule. While we were speeding away from the city towards the Victorian border (and still in the rain), back in Sydney a violent tornado did quite a lot of damage before it tore out into the Tasman sea. If it had happened four days before....Wow!

It was mid-morning before the formalities had all been taken care of, and the Aorangi finally proceeded to her berth. To most of the passengers this was homecoming. To some of us, it was the beginning of a new adventure, and a new kind of a life. As the buildings and streets got closer and closer, we tried to take in every detail. Excitement was in the air, and it was hard not to be influenced by it.

I should have mentioned that while at Auckland, we received

two telegrams One confirming our booking at the "Bondi" hotel.... and the other from our friends in Melbourne telling us that they would meet us at the boat, and inviting us to accompany them back to Melbourne. So as we looked over the crowd on the dock, we tried to find them, but no luck. Later on, while we were parked with our baggage under a big "S" sign, they found us. Our baggage inspection did not take long when they once caught up to our name. In fact, after all the stories we heard of how "tough" and "impolite" the Aussie customs men were reputed to be, we had no trouble at all. As a matter of fact, I could have got away with a brace of machine-guns and a trunk full of time bombs. They didn't open a thing. Perhaps that comes of having a nice, open face !?

Our stay in Sydney was short and hectic. Colonel and Mrs. Morris had arranged hotel bookings ahead on the highway for Wednesday and Thursday nights. So we had to leave at noon on Wednesday. We packed as much into the two days we had as we could, but are looking forward to doing up Sydney right in the not too far distant future. While I made some business calls, Doris and the children went with Mrs. Morris to see the Sydney Zoo. The Kangaroos, Wallabies, and Koala Bears were of course the centre of interest.

The first thing I did Tuesday morning was go to the Bank to see if my account had been transferred from Vancouver. The clerk said "name please" I said "Cliff G. Salmon". 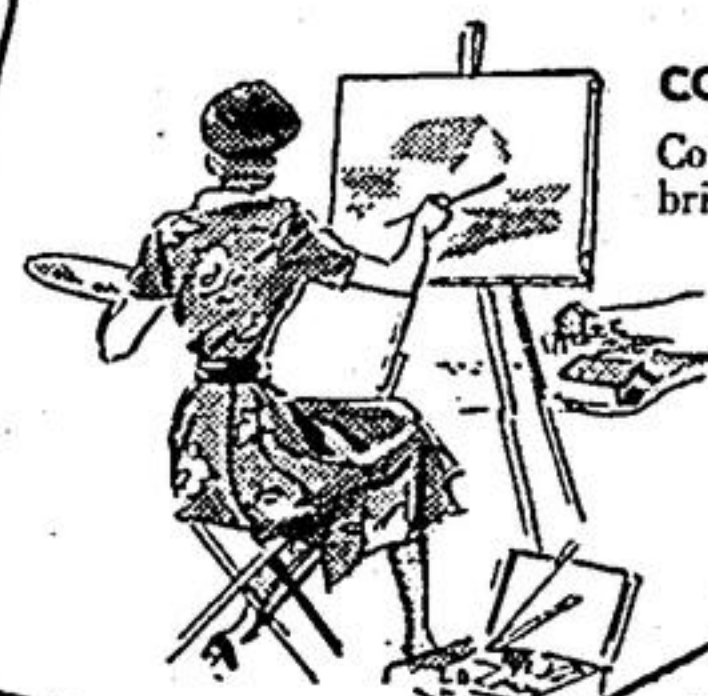
