Congratulations to Edward Pegg on passing with honors at the Art College in Toronto.

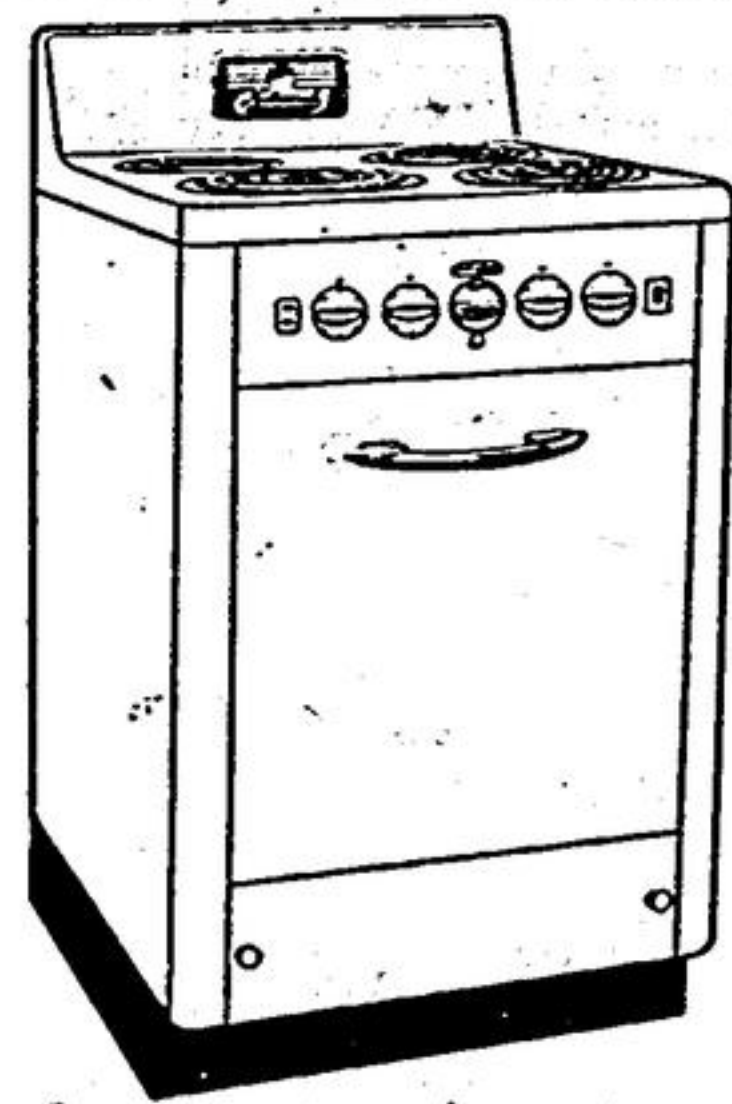
We are pleased to report that Mrs. Norman Rowan returned home from the Oshawa hospital last Friday.
