### MODEL TRAIN FAN SPECIAL PASSES THROUGH TOWN

A C.N.R. special drawing, 204 model train fans, made up of four model railroad and one railroad historical society from Toronto, another from Buffalo, along with railroad sharks from Akron, Ohio, Cleveland and New York City, passed through Stouffville on Saturday, enroute to Cobocok.

Did you know that a little over 30 years ago, during World War I, a passenger could ride the trains an average of 110 million miles without fatal accident. During World War II his chances of fatal accidents were reduced to one in 475 million miles, while in the first half of 1949, only one in about 1,300 million miles. These statistics as compiled by the National Safety Council show that the ratio of injuries per 100 million passenger miles is 0.13 for railroad and 2.1 for passenger automobiles. This means that rail travel is 16 times safer than automobile travel.
