H. G. McIntyre Passes Suddenly in Toronto

The death occurred suddenly in Toronto on Monday, June 19th, of H. Gordon McIntyre of Claremont. Although his business had taken him away from the village in recent years, Mr. McIntyre was a resident here for some time during which he operated the plant near his home, later sold to the Phillips Glass Co.

His wife who survives him, was the former Isabel Brown, and she continues to reside in Claremont. Also surviving is one sister, May of Toronto, and a brother C.S. McIntyre of Victoria, B.C.

More Than Thousand Persons Covered by Ontario County Medical Co-Op

The second annual meeting of the Ontario County Co-operative Medical Services was held in the township hall, Sunderland, on Tuesday with a small but representative group in attendance. The secretary, Mrs. McLean, in her report stated that since the first annual meeting the membership has increased from 166 members covering 470 persons to 413 members covering 1081 persons. This year 47 claims were paid totalling \$2,851.97 or 63.1% of our earned premiums. The average stay in hospital is 10 days.

Mr. Harper Newman introduced the guest speaker of the evening and gave a brief outline of his accomplishments, stating that at the age of 28 he is the secretary and general manager of Cumba which is the largest of the 41 medical co-operatives in Ontario with over 8,000 members. Mr. Paul Meehan in his address, which was spiced with humour, gave an interesting picture of Co-ops. He stated that to-day we are living better, longer and healthier than we formerly did but at an increased cost.

Mr. Meehan stressed the fact that the older the persons the longer it takes to recuperate after an illness and therefore they are greater risks than a younger person. He expressed the hope that in the future all Medical Co-ops. could make use of the electronic accounting machine in a central office which would greatly simplify bookkeeping.

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Mt. Albert Fire Protection for Uxbridge Township

At the regular meeting of Uxbridge Township Council last week, a deputation of ratepayers from the northwest corner of the township interviewed the council on the matter of fire protection. The deputation was accompanied by officials of the Mt. Albert Fire Company, and an agreement was made which will give fire protection to a small area in that section of the township.

A bylaw was introduced and given its several readings which, when approved by the Minister of Education, will set apart 12 public schools in the township as a Township School Area. The Area will include all township schools

with the exception of Scott Union No. 4.

Council also agreed to enter into agreement with the Uxbridge Town Fire Brigade for fire protection in all remaining parts of the township.

Road accounts passed for payment amounted to \$1615.00, and general accounts \$579.00.

The date for the next council meeting was set for July 10th.
