The highlight of this innings was Miller's homer with one on and "Cookie's" two bagger. Miller's home was tagged for at least 350 feet. In the third for Valentia there was nothing across as was three for Stouffville in their half.

The fourth, however, saw Valentia pound out two hits to bring in one run. The Beavers (Stouffville) did not tally in the fourth but Miller cranked out a long double.

In the fifth, Bob Hassard ran into trouble. Valentia touched him for four runs off four hits before the side was retired. Billy Nigh clipped a two-bagger in the fifth for the Beavers, bringing in another run to make the score seven all.

Stouffville collected two runs in the last of the eighth to come within a threatening position of tying the game.

Valentia showed nothing in the first of the ninth as Hassard and Co. worked hard. It looked like a bleak half-innings for Stouffville as they were one down. Big-leaguer Cook stepped up first and rapped out a double. "Butch" Schell however hit a ground ball to the short-stop and Earl Cook interfered with the play when breaking for third. Cooke was called out and the Valentia management insisted that Schell was out also, however, he was not. Billy Nigh hit a nice ball through the infield, to push "Butch" to third and himself to second. The next batter struck out and two were out. Louis Raxlin pinch-hit for Bowdway to score two runs and win first prize money.
