Arctic Exploration. San Francisco, Nov. 5 — The schooner Golden Fleece, which left on July 18th with Lieut. Ray and a Sig. Service party to establish a meteorological station at Point Barrow, returned this evening.

Capt. Perry reported that he had completely circumnavigated Wrangel Land, and had landed at several places, but failed to find any trace of the Jeannette.

NO SUBSTITUTE FOR WORK

This is an age of synthetics. We have synthetic rubber and a host of other manufactured materials which are more or less claimed to be as good if not better than the real thing. As I do not own a car, I cannot pronounce upon the merits of the rubber substitute, but from my acquaintance with motorists I believe they would prefer the product of the rubber plantations. Most substitutes are developed because of a shortage or the high cost of the real thing. The two great wars were chiefly responsible for the development of many new synthetic materials.

The creation of these synthetics is a striking example of the resource and ingenuity of modern man, and particularly of the compelling power of necessity, the mother of invention and enterprise. As the population of the world grows, the necessity for substitute raw materials and even food will be more and more imperative. The marvelous achievements of modern science are not miracles performed by the rubbing of an Aladdin's lamp; they have been the gradual development of individual initiative and skill, prompted by personal ambition to excel and produce something the world needed for its advancement. All progress has been the result of personal initiative which eventually developed into corporate enterprise.

Corporate enterprise, however, cannot take the place of individual initiative and ambition, whether it be to

invent a new gadget or process, or whether it be to operate one and do a job to the best of one's ability. Everybody cannot be an inventor, but everybody can and should obey the Scriptural injunction: "Whatever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might." If that were followed there would be no labor disputes, nor shortages, no economic problems — domestic or national — and our social and moral problems would be reduced to the minimum. "For Satan findeth mischief still for idle hands to do."

Science has invented many mechanical devices and chemical processes that have lightened and speeded up all forms of manual and clerical work, but no one has yet invented a substitute for work. Indeed it may be said that, while work has been lightened, it has been intensified. With all his inventions, modern man has not found relief from the necessity of working for a living. I remarked upon that fact in the course of conversation with a small group of friends, and one lady, whose husband has a steady job at a moderately good salary, said the only hope of relief from having to work for a living was to get a "break" by winning in a sweepstake. Judging by the wide sale of sweepstake tickets, there are millions of people living in the same hope. But it is a vain hope, except for a minute number of "lucky" ticket holders. And that is fortunate for the world in general, for if it were possible for everybody to win a fortune in sweepstakes the entire machinery of modern life would come to a full stop.

Voice of Prophecy Bible Questions And Answers

Question—What is the abomination of desolation spoken of by Daniel and mentioned by Jesus in Matthew 24:15?

Answer—The parallel passage in Luke 21:20 reads: "And when ye shall see Jerusalem compassed with armies, then know that the desolation thereof is nigh." The abomination of desolation evidently refers to the desolating heathen armies of Rome with their pagan standards.

Q.—Please tell me where to find the text which says that we have a living soul.

A.—You may refer to Genesis 2:7, which says that man is a living soul, not that he has a living soul. "And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul."

Q.—What causes dreams? Does God send them?

A.—For the cause of dreams induced by physical or mental conditions, men consult a physician or a psychiatrist. On the other hand, the Bible declares that God does speak to men by dreams. Numbers 12:6: "If there be a prophet among you, I the Lord will speak unto him in a dream." A prophetic dream was given to Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon. (See Daniel 2.)

Q.—The gospel has been preached for 1900 years, but hasn't converted the world yet. How much longer do you think it will take?

A.—Christ's promise was not that the preaching of the gospel would convert the world, but that it would be a witness to the world. Matthew 24:14: "And this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come."

Q.—What is the meaning of the expression "a time and times and the dividing of time?" (Daniel 7:25).

A.—In Revelation 12:6 we read: "And the woman fled into the wilderness, where she hath a place prepared of God, that they should feed her there a thousand two hundred and threescore days." This period is again expressed in verse 14 by "a time, and times, and half (dividing of) a time." These 1260 days are here used in symbolic prophecy and must refer to a literal period of time.

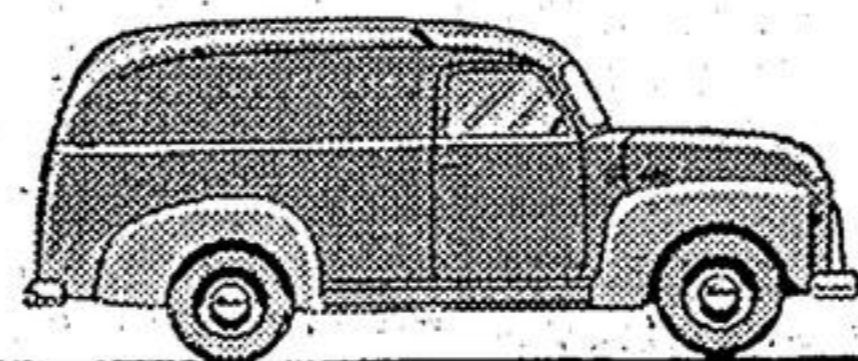
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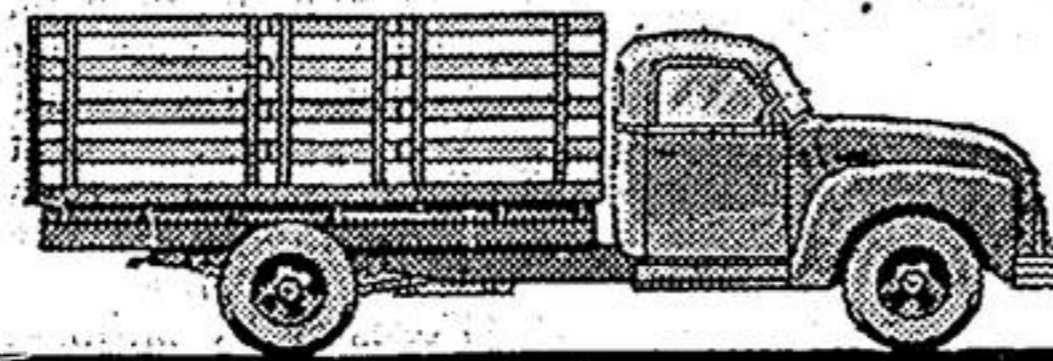

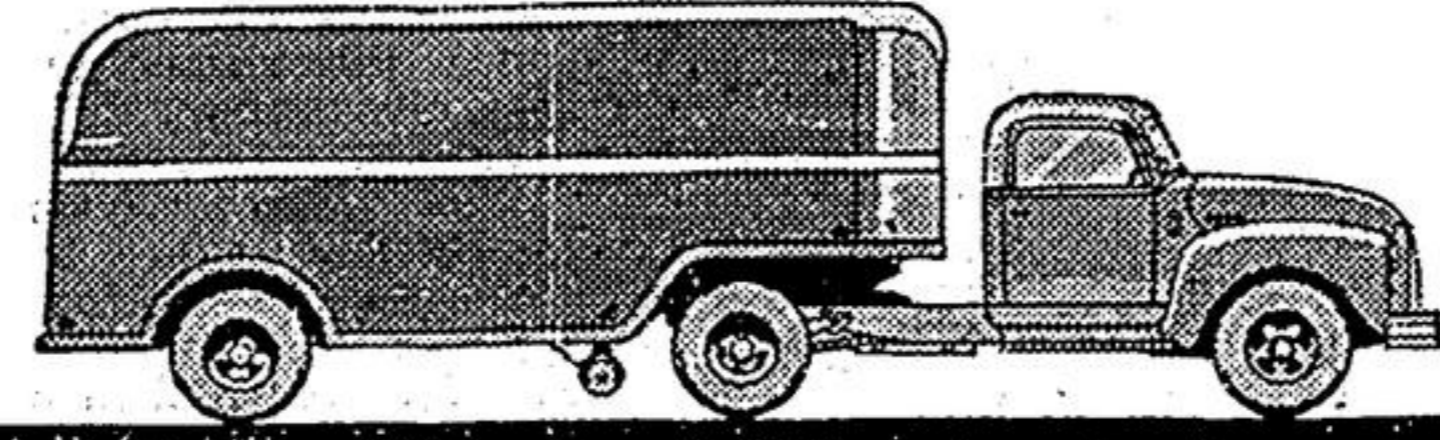
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
