Gormley Cattle in Mexican Shipment

Mexicans Purchase 140 Head of Canadian Holsteins, Include 10 Bulls to Start Artificial Breeding Unit

Two females from the herd of Harry A. Smith, Gormley, were among the shipment of 140 head of purebred Holsteins recently sold to Mexican buyers. Three were also chosen from the stock of the Ontario Hospital, Langstaff.

The cattle consisting of 18 bulls and 122 females, the latter largely bred heifers and the balance open heifers, will go to three different districts.

Highlight of the shipment was the purchase by the Government of Mexico of ten top bulls, all at four figure prices and headed by Raymondale Yalta at \$10,000, to be used in a new Artificial Breeding Unit being established near Mexico City. It is planned to use only Canadian bulls in this unit.

Other buyers were: Jose Luis Garcia, Guadalajara; Jose Barcia Valseca, Queretaro; and Isidro Fabela, Mexico City. Heading the group of buyers was Dr. Jose Figueroa, representing the Mexican government. He was assisted by Dr. Ruben Fernandez, who was paying his second visit to Canada. Third member of the party was Jose Luis Garcia.

Included in the bulls purchased for the Government of Mexico, were: Raymondale Yalta, bought from his joint owners W. A. Hodge, St. Laurent, and H. L. Guilbert, Vercheres, Que., at \$10,000 top price of the Hodge dispersal sale; a son of Marksmen from W. S. Hall and H. C. Cookson, Oakville, Ont., at \$3,200, second highest price at the National Holstein Sale; a son of the former World Champion 305 day fat producer on twice-a-day milking from Archie Rath, Mossley; a double grandson of Marksmen from Wm. E. Minshall, Brantford, Ont., a son of the \$20,000 four times All-Canadian Spring Farm Sovereign Supreme from J. M. Fraser, Streetsville, Ont.; a son of Yalta from W. A. Hodge; a son of Sonniwillk Sovereign Souvenir from David R. Stevens, St. Mary's, Ont., a son of Farfields Grandee from L. B. Reid, Ripley, Ont., and a son of Sonniwillk Sovereign and a grandson of Marksmen from Roy C. Warwick, Cedar Springs, Ont.

Heading the Valseco purchases were four bulls: a son of the three times All-Canadian Rowdsdale Rag Apple Sovereign from Gordon R. Sinclair, Freeman, Ont., a grandson of the twice 1,000 lb. Montvic Meg Empress from H. L. Guilbert, Vercheres, Que., a son of Triune out of the Excellent Reserve All-Canadian Aged Cow for 1949 from Elmercroft Farms, Oshawa; and from Roy C. Warwick, a son of a Very Good cow with 25,917 lbs. milk in a year.

Top of the Fabela purchases was a show son of a 807 lb. 2x daughter of the Extra Sire Raymondale Ormsby King received from Gordon Innes, Woodstock, Ont., while heading the Garcia cattle was a grandson of Paul Texal Rag Apple out of a daughter of Marksmen from Sheffield Farms, St. George, Ont., and two bulls of Lochinvar—Monogram breeding from G. A. Hogg, Thamesford, Ont.

Local Missionary Writes from Orient

Tali, Yunnan, West China
 March 18, 1950.

Dear Friends:
 We wrote you a letter in October shortly after arrival here but it seems that it never arrived home to be printed as we have heard nothing whatever about it. However you will all realize that we arrived here safely, by now after a safe and quick trip from Hongkong Island. Bandits had been bothering trucks just ahead of us but we saw nothing of them.

Now we are settled in our little home in Tali which has been fixed over a bit and which is proving very comfortable and convenient. We are thrilled to have electric lights, after all last term with such miserable lamps. We have a large garden and flowers, vegetables and grass all coming along nicely. One can garden most of the year here and I am getting to be an enthusiast (Gladys speaking). We feel all these things are from the Lord's good hand and He has made the almost impossible task of coming back to China with a family at such a time seem pleasant, easy and profitable. We can't say how long we may be able to stay, but the opportunities are numerous and the results encouraging.

Frank has made twenty-two trips to the country places of longer or short duration since we arrived here in October. His usual procedure is to leave here on a Thursday and spend until the next Tuesday with a church in a certain place holding Bible classes for the Christians and usually a meeting in the evening. This work is planned by the Tali church board and Frank goes out in accordance with their plans. After the Chinese New Year which was in Feb. all the districts had conferences of a week each and a group from the Tali church (Chinese) with Frank had from three to five meetings a day to conduct at the various places. We are so glad to see the concern the Tali church has for these smaller churches and the way the Chinese are more and more taking responsibility.

I have been able to accompany Frank on only three of these trips so far, as I am teaching Philip and one of the other missionaries' children. The road to the Kuling school is still closed to us, so we are now coming to the last term of Philip's Grade 2 work and Julia's Grade 1 work. Both are learning much more than I ever thought they would with Mummy's inexperienced teaching. I tried Philip on a Grade 3 work book "Streets and Roads" and he seems to be managing it quite well. He had completed the work in the Grade 2 books I brought with me. The Mission School standard is higher than our Canadian one so he will have to make an effort to catch up I am afraid.

We have secured an excellent woman to help in the kitchen. She memorizes all the recipes I give her and has a nice hot "western" style meal ready for us when I get home at noon. Her bread is without reproach and cookies and puddings emerge from the oven with the same homey flavor we have always been used to. Food has been very cheap up to now, but is taking a rise with the changes of government, money etc. However, eggs are still only three cents each, Yunnan money which is less than a cent gold, and I bought lard the other day at about 15 cents gold a pound. With the change of money my bookkeeping is going to be a sorry mess I am afraid but this will only be the fifth time or so we have had a change in currency since coming to China.

We were glad to get letters from all of you who wrote around Christmas time. Mail seems to have got piled up somewhere and we are still waiting for January mail to arrive. However, keep writing for we are bound to receive it some day, and it does such a lot to give one a boost. We have no radios or newspapers so the world goes on pretty much without us these days.

Samples of the crop of the accused farmers had been taken on a routine inspection. The men were notified in five different letters the potatoes must be destroyed.

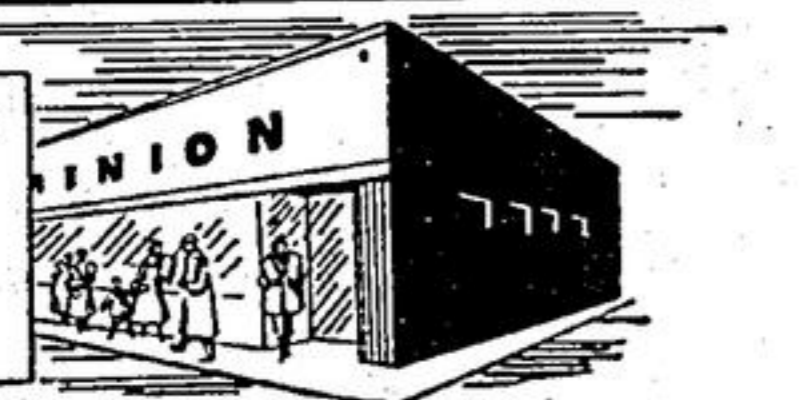
