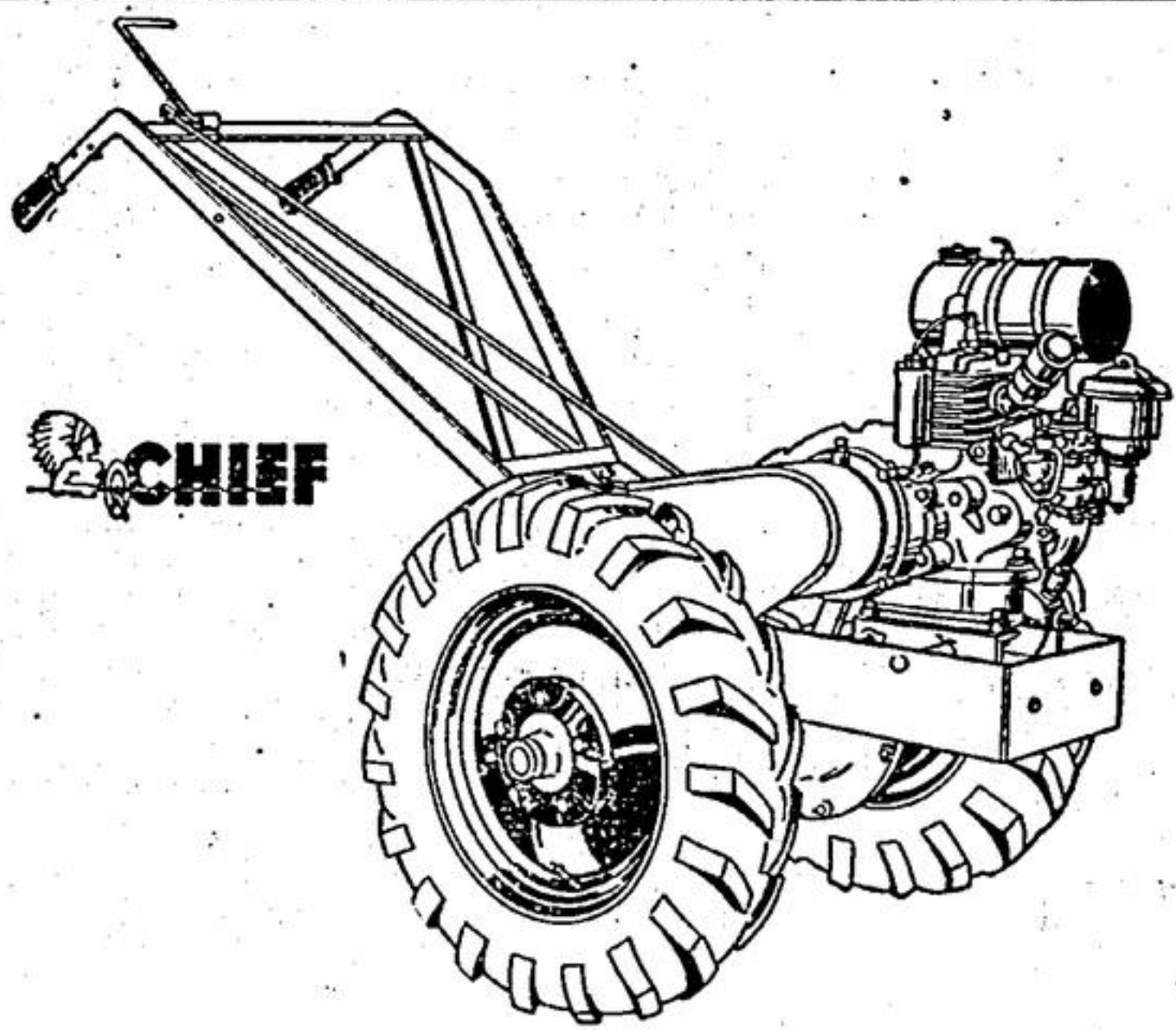

Garage Robber Gets 3 Years

Stanley W. Jones, about 28, of Toronto was sentenced Friday to three years for breaking into a garage at Manchester, and stealing goods valued at \$150. The term is consecutive with four months remaining from a previous conviction for breaking and entering. Jones was on parole at the time of the Manchester break-in. Harvey Foreman of Toronto, also charged, was freed. Crown counsel said there was insufficient evidence for prosecution.
