Floodlight Tournament On Saturday, July 15

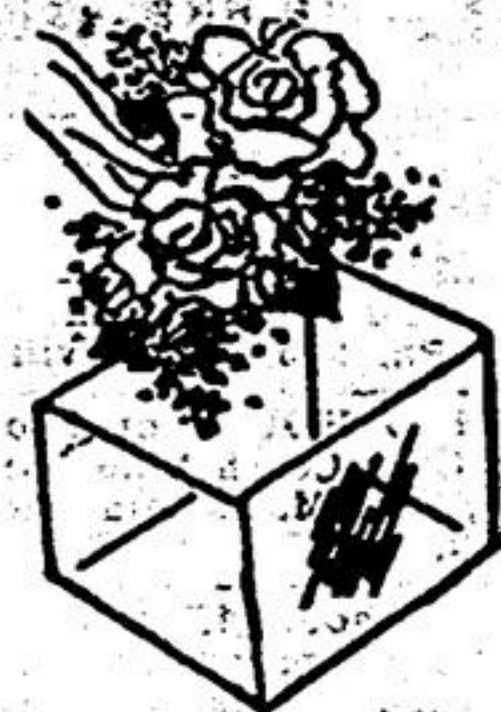
