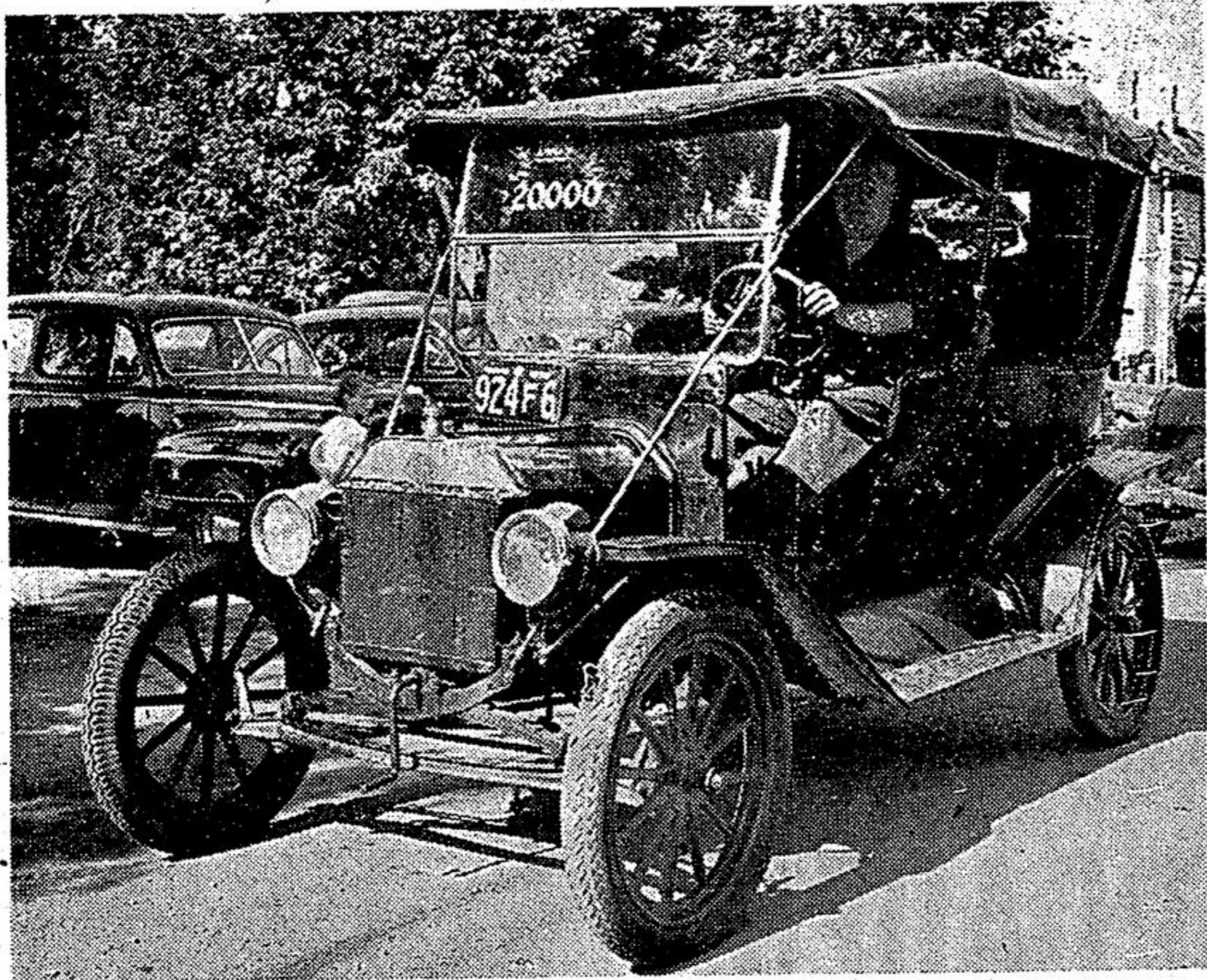


KING OF FORTY YEARS AGO

C. L. Carter Lived Most of Life at Green River

The death occurred at Ballantrae on Friday, Aug. 11th of Charles Leslie Carter, native of Cherrywood, but who had spent the most of his life at Green River. Although only fifty-four years of age, he was forced to retire from the farm a little more than a year ago, due to ill health, and moved to Ballantrae. Deceased was a son of Benjamin and Mary Carter. In 1922 he was united in marriage with Ethel Davis who survives him.

Besides his wife, the late Charles Carter is survived by one son Aylmer and a grandson; a sister is Mrs. Albert Gray (Lily) of Brougham, and three brothers, Roy and Frank of Green River, and Ralph of Markham.

The funeral on Sunday, was conducted from the late home with service in the Whitevale United Church conducted by Rev. J. McLachlan. Interment was made in Whitevale Cemetery.

Pallbearers were Delbert Kidd, Clifford Wallwork, Thomas Clark, Ross Hood, Delos Graham and Geo. Keay. A large number of friends attended the service and the beautiful floral tributes testified to the high esteem in which the deceased was held.

Mrs. Reuben R. Rawson Passes in 85th Year

Funeral services for the late Mrs. Mary Rawson were held on Saturday afternoon, Aug. 12th, in the Claremont United Church, conducted by Rev. Harold Lackie, with interment in Union Cemetery, Claremont. Pall bearers were Thomas Gregg, John Beiboy, William Palmer, Harold Dickinson, Fred Pugh and Walter Ward, all of Claremont.

The late Mrs. Rawson was born on the 9th of Pickering 84 years ago, the daughter of David and Mary McFarlane. In 1894 she was married to Reuben R. Rawson and they farmed on the 4th concession of Uxbridge Township. Following her husband's death in 1925, Mrs. Rawson moved to Claremont. She had remarkable health for her age, and cared for her own home until last Easter, at which time she went to live with her daughter at Moore's Falls, in Haliburton, where she passed away on Thursday, Aug. 10th. The late Mrs. Rawson suffered from arthritis.

The deceased was identified with the Women's Missionary Society of Claremont United Church, and previously of the Presbyterian Church.

She is survived by two sons, Dr. Donald S. Rawson, Professor in the University at Saskatoon, and Robert J. Rawson, head gardener of the Ontario Hospital at St. Thomas, and one daughter, Mrs. S. Shaver (May) of Moore's Falls, and eight grandchildren. Two brothers, John McFarlane of California, and David McFarlane of British Columbia also survive. Mr. James McCreight of Stouffville is a nephew.

Council Appoints Permanent Member to Health Unit

Councillor Harold Spofford of Stouffville, was named as the town's permanent member to the Board of Health of the York County Health Unit, at a special meeting of the municipal council held on Thursday evening. The unit includes eleven of the northern municipalities in the county, Aurora, Markham, Newmarket, Richmond Hill, Stouffville, Sutton, Woodbridge, and the townships of Georgina, N. Gwillimbury, and Vaughan.

Council dealt at some length with the problem of bridges which cross the stream on Summerhill Market and Burkholder Sts. in the park. Load restriction signs have been erected at all these crossings, but the park bridge is in dangerous condition and it was agreed that a new bridge with cement buttments and steel beams should be erected there. The steel

is expected to arrive this week and some beams may be put in place immediately to strengthen the structure until such time as the road can be closed and the cement work proceeded with.

Councillor Ratcliff reported that the gravel trucks had been sternly warned by both the provincial and town police regarding breaking the thirty mile speed limit in town. A large number received summonses this week for violations.

"We'll keep the pressure on till they slow down, and three speeding tickets means automatic reckless driving and license suspension," stated Councillor Ratcliff.

Grave concern was felt over the situation when school re-opens unless traffic is slowed down.

Council agreed that the police should go the limit in prosecutions for the safety of pedestrians.

Plans Progressing for Whitchurch Centennial

Plans are steadily going ahead for the forthcoming Whitchurch Township Centennial Celebration on Sept. 16th and 17th. Every effort is being made by the committees to make this memorable event an occasion that will be remembered for many years to come.

The Historical Committee has almost completed the collection of data and photographs throughout the township to be published in booklet form, ready for distribution on Sept. 16th. The booklet, it is hoped, will lend a fitting background to the historical event to be celebrated.

This committee is also preparing to give historical recognition to Aurora, Newmarket and Stouffville by public address system during the motor cavalcade which is part of the Saturday festivities centred at Cedar Beach, Musselman's Lake.

The Sunday mass service will be in the Newmarket Arena, and fuller announcement concerning the details of this service will be announced later.

Dressmaker Here Forty Years Ago

The death occurred in Toronto this week following a lengthy illness of Mrs. Sarah Rich Chapell, who will be remembered by many of our elder residents as a dressmaker in Stouffville some forty years ago.

Deceased was the former Sarah Howard, and was born on the 7th concession of Markham Township. Mr. Rich was employed as a paper hanger in both Stouffville and Markham. The couple lived here for a number of years on Market Street and over Huntley's Store.

Some years ago she married James Chapell who has also predeceased her.

Surviving is one daughter Mrs. Ida Leonard, grandsons Bill and Howard Leonard, and granddaughters, Margaret (Mrs. C. Brown), and Gertrude (Mrs. R. Rice).

The funeral on Thursday will be conducted from the chapel of McDougall & Brown, Toronto, with interment in the Stouffville Cemetery.

New Tree Plan Cuts Down Waste in Planting

A new "on-the-spot" advisory system of tree distribution to private landowners by the Ontario Dept. of Lands and Forests is expected to pay big dividends in cutting down wastage. Under the new plan which was first tried out last year, trees for planting next spring must be ordered by August 15 so that department experts have time to inspect areas planned for planting.

Visits are designed to correct the practice of farmers and other individuals ordering more trees than needed for a specified area and also selecting trees unsuitable

for certain soil types. Frequently other advice and assistance can be given which will be helpful, particularly to those who have not planted trees before.

The system was explained to Whitchurch Township Council at their last regular meeting.

"In general, the landowners are reacting very well to these inspections," Asst. Reforestation, Chief G. H. Bayly stated.

"I don't think there is any doubt that this system will pay big dividends in terms of better choice of species and, therefore, in higher average survival of planting stocks."

Mother of Well-Known Local Family Passes In Hospital

Following some six years of failing health, the last twelve days of which were spent in hospital, Mrs. Amrose Stover passed away in Brierbush Hospital on Monday, Aug. 14th. A private funeral service, conducted by Rev. H. Hallman, was held at the residence on Mill Street on Wednesday, Aug. 16th, followed by public service in the United Missionary Church, with interment in Stouffville Cemetery.

Pall bearers were Harvey Schell, Levi Forsyth, Fred Pugh, Paul Bowdway, Reginald Stouffer and Lloyd Wideman.

The late Mrs. Stover was born at Dickson's Hill 57 years ago. She was the former Lovina Raymer, daughter of Peter Raymer and Sarah Catharine Dresser Raymer. Thirty-eight years ago she was united in marriage with Albert Amrose Stover, who is well known throughout the entire district as proprietor of the Stouffville Bakery, and who survives her. For a very short time the couple lived in Markham and Toronto, but practically all their married life has been spent in Stouffville.

The deceased lived a very quiet life, devoted to making a good home for her husband and family. She is survived by two sons, Harry W. of Stouffville, and F. Bruce of Belleville, and four daughters, Mrs. Jack Spang (Velma), Mrs. Howard Ratcliff (Gladys), Mrs. Donald Brown (Norma) of Hamilton, and Mrs. Delos Brown (Margaret) of Colborne. Four brothers also survive Mrs. Stover, Arthur, Chester and Roy Raymer of Toronto and Elmer of Richville, and three sisters, Mrs. Orville Brillinger (Ella) of Pine Orchard, Mrs. Ken Mills (Viola) of Newmarket, and Mrs. Fox (Alma) of Malton.

Missing Pair Feared Murdered, Reported Near Stouffville

While police continue to try and fit together the scattered pieces of a puzzle which would explain what became of a high school teacher, Alfred Greene, 38, of Toronto, and a bricklayer's wife, Mrs. Betty Reason, 31, a report comes in that they have been seen leaving a little-used sideroad just west of Stouffville, and again in a restaurant in Aurora. These reports have all come in since the blood-stained automobile of the missing man was found in an east Toronto ravine. He was believed to have been carrying about \$200, and his empty wallet and broken glasses were discovered with the car.

Questioning Greene's friends, police discovered that Mrs. Reason, a former student of Greene's had also vanished.

Oak Ridges Ratepayers Association To Back Whitchurch Candidate

Supporting one of the principles for which it was organized, better municipal government, Oak Ridges-Lake Wilcox Ratepayers Association voted to sponsor a member as candidate for Whitchurch Township Council in this year's elections. A motion that Stanley Rule be chosen was carried without a dissenting vote. Four members did not vote either way.

Several persons in addressing the meeting stressed the advantage of an early nomination, lending strength to the nominee's campaign for election. With only one objection against immediate action the President, W. D. Renwick, put the motion for Mr. Rule's nomination to a vote.

Mr. Rule thanked the members for their support in a brief address. He expressed confidence in the continued growth of the district and said the fact that the community now numbered many year round residents would undoubtedly prove a strong factor in electing a representative to the council.

Mennonite Speaker Sees Communism Squeezing Out Mission Worker

"Communism, nationalism and other forces are at work and it is only a matter of time before missionaries will probably have to withdraw from West Africa," said Gordon J. Bolender, missionary on furlough from Nigeria when addressing a missionary rally at the United Missionary camp grounds. He was one of eight speakers on foreign missionary work.

Vice-president of the denomination's work in Nigeria, Mr. Bolender said that a self-supporting, self-propagating, native church must be fully organized and set up as quickly as possible so that Christianity might be spread even if the missionaries have to withdraw.

In charge of the morning session was Rev. Ward M. Shantz, principal of Emmanuel Bible College and secretary of the foreign missions board of the Ontario conference.

Dr. R. H. Bell of Stayner described the hospital now under construction in northern Nigeria. The building will cost about \$40,000.

Rev. Arthur Walsh of Bethany United Missionary Church and a member of the general missionary board, was in charge of the afternoon session.

Main address of the afternoon was given by Rev. R. P. Dittmer of New Carlisle, Ohio, general foreign secretary.

Referring particularly to Japan and India, Rev. Mr. Dittmer emphasized that the church must send as many missionaries as possible at once while conditions remain favorable.

Speeders and Overloaders Paid In Nearly \$200 This Week
