Pickering Township Will Keep Sunday A Peaceful Day

Pickering Township Council turned down a request from the Pickering Beach Rifle and Gun Club to operate in the township on Sunday mornings. Councillors voiced the opinion at their special meeting on Thursday that Sunday was meant as a day of peace and quiet, and it would be unfair to those who wished to keep the sanctity of the Sabbath to permit shooting operations.

Council agreed to tender a price of \$1,750 for five acres of land now owned by the Dept. of Highways at lot 17 in the 1st concession. Pickering officials believe this particular land parcel to be excellently situated for industrial purposes.

Road Supt. Roy Ward was instructed to have Stop signs erected at the corner of the 2nd concession and the Altona Road.

Council decided against any action at present on the recommendation of the Planning Board that Engineer Culham prepare an enlarged plan of the south eastern part of the township showing houses, etc. for use at a later date on a Master Plan of the entire township. The cost, which would be entirely borne by the township, would be between \$300 and \$350.

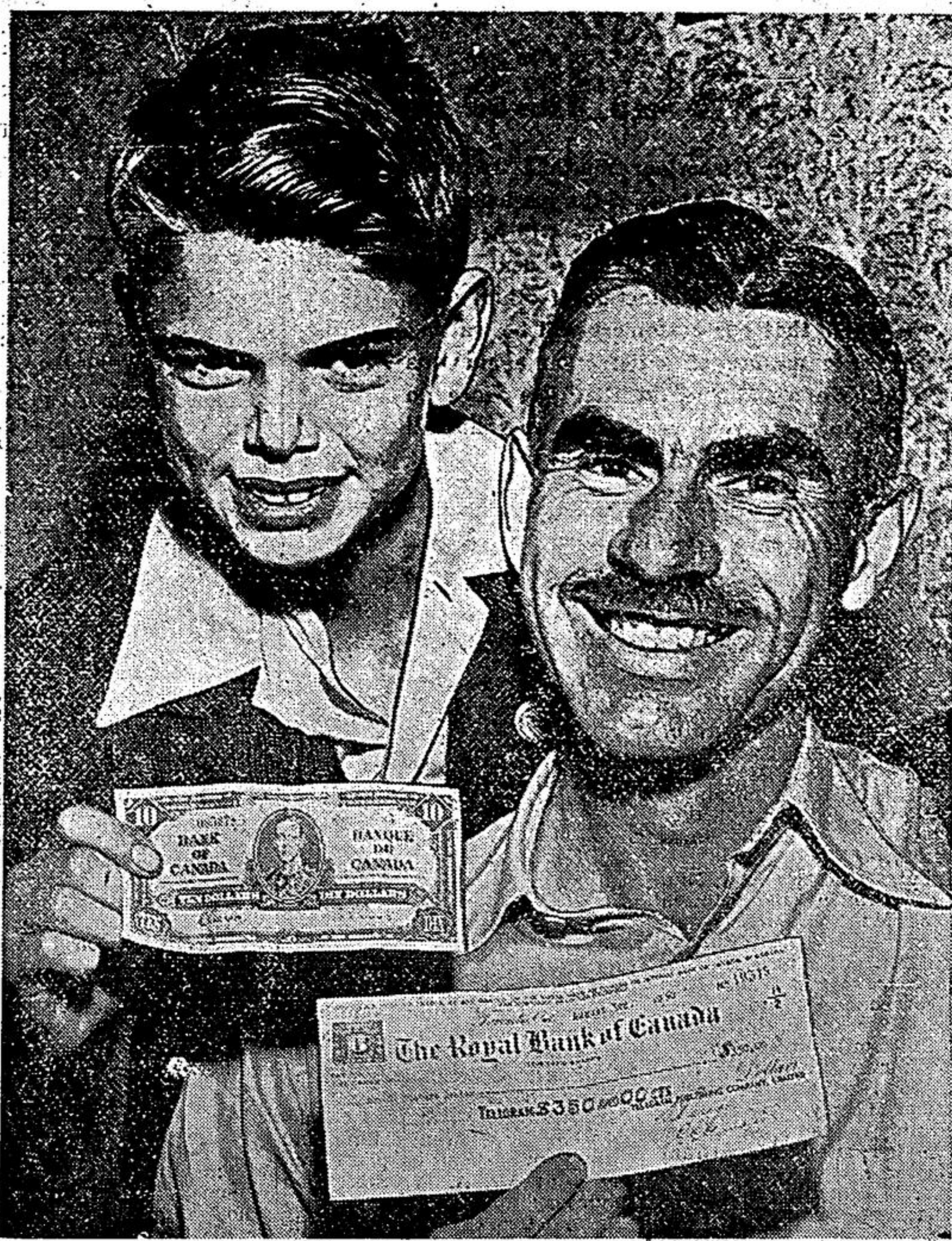
Mrs. D. L. Mairs has been sick during the past week but is somewhat improved. Her many friends wish her a speedy recovery.
