

### Ex-Reeve of Markham Disposes of Business

After operating it for seven years Vern W. Griffin has sold his grocery and dry goods business at Thornhill to Alex. Gilbert of Kitchener. Mr. Gilbert took over on Friday.

The new owner formerly operated a store at Elackstock near Bowmanville for six years and was also in the grocery business at Kitchener for four years. He has spent the last five years with a paper house, travelling for it. Coming with him to Thornhill will be Mrs. Gilbert and their three children, aged one, five and eleven years.

While his plans are somewhat uncertain at the moment Mr. Griffin, former Reeve of Markham Township, says that he expects to remain in the district. It is possible, he says, that he may erect a warehouse for the handling of Pratt and Lambert paints and varnishes of which he is distributor. He has operated his present store for seven years.

The business which has just been sold has an interesting history, and is probably the oldest property in the district continuously occupied for business purposes. The land was bought in 1843 by Archibald Gallanough and the building erected about that time. It was occupied as a general store for many years. In 1934 it was sold by a John Grice to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Charlton. Thornhill post office was at one time located in the southwest corner of the building, a site which it occupied for about forty years. The Gallanough family, builders of the property, located in Thornhill in 1824.

Two-year-old Robert Hannah was buried under a pile of loose sand Saturday by his father's tractor at Oak Ridges.

He was found by his brother, Jack, 7, with his arm sticking out of the sand and the tractor almost on top of him. Robert was removed to the Hospital for Sick Children

with a fractured hip bone and severe shock.

Mrs. Hannah said her son started the tractor by himself. "He had watched several men start it before," she said. "He must have gone into the garage, got the crank and started it."

Mr. Hannah, who operates the Village Bar, a restaurant and service station, next door, where the tractor was, said he was out on a towing job and no one was around the garage.

### Stan Rule Next Wilcox Lake Candidate Whitchurch Election

Mr. Stan Rule of Oak Ridges will represent Wilcox Lake at the next election of Whitchurch Township Council. His nomination as candidate was confirmed last week by a meeting of the Wilcox Lake-Oak Ridges Ratepayers' Association.

Contending that the minutes of the previous meeting were incorrect, James Anderson, Wilcox Lake, claimed that the July meeting at which Mr. Rule was first nominated was not announced as a nomination meeting. President R. W. Renwick said nominations could be made at any meeting. The question of procedure regarding the adoption of the minutes was argued by two of the members. "We know what you fellows want," said S. Beamish, "accept the minutes and then put up your candidate. As the minutes state Mr. Rule was nominated at the last meeting. If you want to nominate another man, why not come out with it. Arguing about the adoption of the minutes that are correct is not the way to go about the matter."

M. C. Vandervoort, addressing the meeting, said "I don't care how much you fight in this meeting but when you do choose a man by a majority vote get behind him a hundred per cent and get him elected. Stan Rule has been sport enough to throw his hat in the ring again. It has been suggested that we support more than one man. This is legal but not feasible." Mr. Vandervoort moved that only one man be nominated by the Association. The motion was carried unanimously.

**MARRIAGE LAW EFFECTIVE OCTOBER 2nd**  
Ontario's revised marriage law becomes effective October 2, it was disclosed last week by the provincial secretary's office.  
The legislation, passed at the last session of the Ontario Legislature, will allow, in addition to religious marriages, the performance of ceremonies by county and district judges and by magistrates.  
Another provision is that a judge may declare a person missing for seven years to be presumed dead so the way is cleared for the other party to marry again.

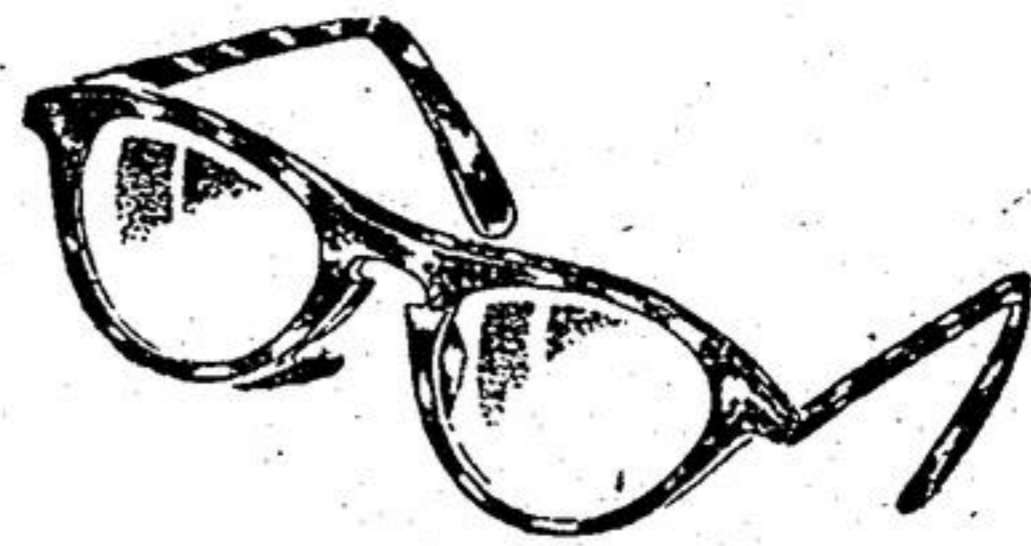
**WANTON DAMAGE TO BOGARTOWN SCHOOL**

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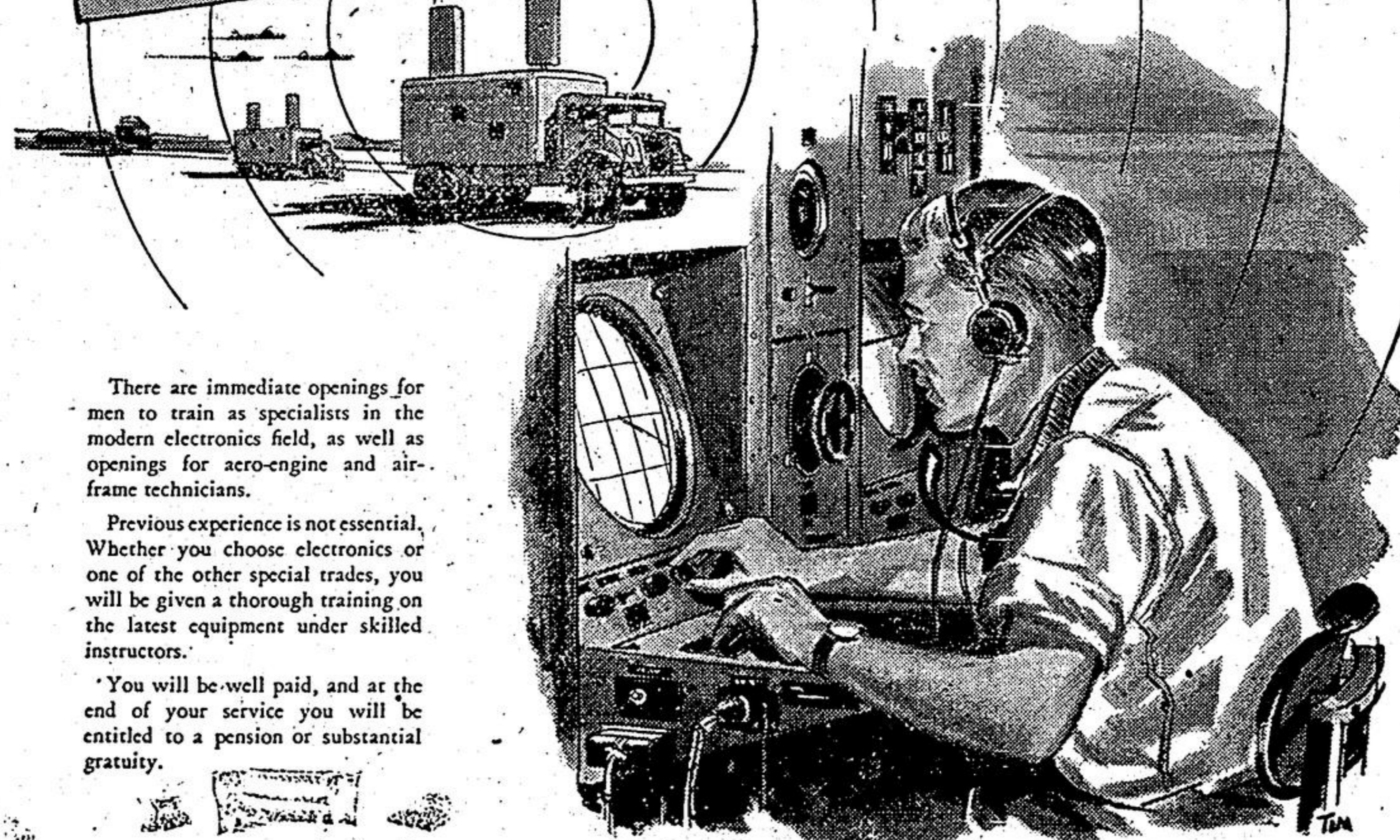
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### Village of Stouffville
