On Local Passenger Train Run, Couldn't Make Last Trip

When the railway resumed operations through Stouffville last week, a face familiar to many people using its passenger facilities for the past few years was missing.

Alfred West would have retired last week, as a conductor after 48 years of railroading, but there was no train for his final trip. The railway strike cancelled the last run of the C.N.R. man, who began his time as a conductor 40 years ago, immediately after the end of the 1910 strike.

"Alfie" as he was familiarly known on his run through Stouffville, from Toronto to Peterboro, was a large heavy set man with red face and large nose. His wife, for many years an invalid, passed away at their home in Lindsay some time ago. This conductor husband did the housework, and educated the children, one son being a doctor.

Mr. West was born in Wiltshire, England, and started working for the Great Western Railway in 1902 at the age of 16. He came to Canada in 1907, landed at Mimico on a Friday night and started to work as a brakeman the following morning.

Mr. West has the greatest respect for the section gangs who keep the tracks and roadbed in good shape.

He escaped injury but was in a ticklish spot four years ago when his train was derailed at Omeme. He was trapped in the vestibule between two coaches as the cars bumped to a stop.
