The new mastic top floor in the Newmarket Arena is now reaching completion.

Believe it or not, skating in Stouffville is only three weeks away.

Junkin, a southpaw mound star with Sunderland some seasons back has hurled Penelon Falls to a Tri-County group win over Lindsay.

Tommy Anderson, last season coach with Oshawa Generals has been named as coach of the Leaf's Pittsburgh farm hands.

Chubby Wilkinson, well-known Aurora Junior hockey player has been dealt a cruel blow. He was recently involved in a motorcycle accident which has left him a wheel-chair patient for the balance of his life. A \$5,000 fund has been started in Aurora on his behalf.

Aurora has not had too much luck to date in organizing for this coming season's hockey program. Two rather unenthusiastic meetings have been held, but bets are that an Intermediate team will be iced.

Chuck Nesbitt, former Markham hockey star, last winter with Bradford Intermediates, is understood to have definitely retired.

Johnny Hines, representative of the Newmarket Hockey Club was in Stouffville this week to discuss ways and means of getting Newmarket into this year's Stouffville hockey loop. While the Newmarketers would like to continue in Intermediate 'A' class, they would like to operate in the local Senior 'B' circuit. A year ago Newmarket did not take too kindly to ideas which the locals had about getting into the Trolley League, but they have apparently come to the conclusion that a teamup with their eastern neighbor might be the best bet after all.

The Ontario Minor Hockey Association has sent a letter to all "D" series teams asking for the opinion of the teams on the following proposed regulation covering the series: "That the 'D' series be restricted to villages of approximately 1000 or less population. Such teams will be permitted to sign players who reside outside the village, but within five miles of the post office (or centre of the village.) Teams may also sign players from other villages within the 5-mile limit providing the combined population does not exceed 1000."

The town of Lindsay is advertising a meeting between it and the Ontario Municipal Board. The meeting will take the form of a hearing at which time the town will ask permission from the Board to issue debentures amounting to \$6000 covering the cost of replacing Arena piping. This figure, it is reliably reported, is on the outside. The actual anticipated cost is in the neighborhood of \$5,000 which is to include installation of the new piping. An estimate of the actual cost of replacing the piping is about \$10,000.

It would appear from information coming to this reporter's desk that Lindsay is most fortunate in not having to foot the entire bill for new pipes in their arena, since they were using steel tubing for their arena piping, and we understand had been informed by the ice companies that this material would be eaten out by the sand base. If this base were not properly treated each year.

Pipes in the Stouffville Arena are iron, and do not require this sand treatment. The calcium chloride brine used in the pipes however, is neutralized to prevent it from eating out the welded joints.
