Nearly \$3,000 for Missions from Local Church

The financial reports for both appointments were given and officers elected for the new conference year.

The financial reports again showed an increase over that of

Speaks Well for Such Schools as Stouffville

Students from rural high schools do better than the provincial average in departmental examinations, Dr. J. G. Althouse, Ontario's chief director of education, said this week.

He told the Toronto Rotary Club that by devoting 25 per cent of the curriculum to agricultural and home economics subjects, the 70 agricultural secondary schools encouraged pupils to take a keen interest in school work. In addition, parents were satisfied that children were being prepared for a wide range of occupations and careers.

"These rural high schools do not know the full answer to the problem of pupil retention, but they have made more progress than any other single group of schools in Canada," Dr. Althouse said.

PRESBYTERIAN MINISTER 50 YEARS

A minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada for more than half a century, Rev. John Alexander Mustard, D.D., 83, died Sunday at Runnymede Hospital after a prolonged illness.

Dr. Mustard had served as moderator of the Toronto Presbytery and also the Toronto and Kingston Synod of the Presbyterian Church. He retired in 1937. From 1943 until last October he was the Presbyterian chaplain for Toronto hospitals.

Dr. Mustard was born in Scott Township and attended Uxbridge High School. He graduated in arts from the University of Toronto in 1889 and for 18 months taught at Prince Albert High School, Sask. In 1898 he graduated from Knox College, which in 1946 conferred upon him the honorary degree of doctor of divinity. He held mission charges at Botany, Kent Bridge and Harwich. He was ordained by the Chatham Presbytery in 1895. After spending some years in pastorates in Colorado, New Mexico and Iowa, Dr. Mustard returned to Canada in 1906. From 1909 and 1928 he was minister of Dufferin Street Presbyterian Church and subsequently for 10 years pastor of Oakwood Church. He was a member of Dovercourt Road Presbyterian Church.

He leaves his wife, the former Catharine MacFarlane of 265 Havelock St., and one son, Gordon A. Mustard.
