Beaverton Farmer High In 50 Bus. Wheat Club

The Ontario County Crop Improvement Association sponsored a 50 Bushel Winter Wheat Club this year. Some splendid yields were secured. The yield of 71.8 bushels per acre from the farm of Duncan Wallace, Beaverton, R.R.3, ranks with the highest from the whole Province of Ontario. Only a very few farmers in the province secured a yield of 70 bushels or better.

The three highest contestants, namely Duncan Wallace, Beaverton, Jack Beaton, Blackwater, and Elmer Powell, Oshawa, now have the opportunity of competing with the three high winners from other 50 Bushel Winter Wheat Clubs in the province for the Provincial Championship at the Royal Winter Fair.

Prize money for the local 50 Bushel Winter Wheat Club and the Provincial Competition at the Royal is provided by the Maple Leaf Milling Company.

A 50 Bushel Winter Wheat Club for 1951 has been organized. Any farmer wishing to join this club should get in touch with H. L. Fair, Agricultural Representative, Uxbridge, Ontario, as soon as possible.

Township Costs Not Shared Equally States Ex-Warden

Mr. G. M. Forsyth, Ex-Warden of Ontario County and Ex-Reeve of Pickering Township, stated his belief at the October meeting of Pickering Township Council that the township should be divided into two sections for purposes of some municipal expenditures. Taking above the third concession as the northern section, and below as the third as the southern division, he advocated the south have whatever improvements they wanted, but letting them pay for them. He contended the northern section should not be expected to help pay for the expensive police protection necessary in the southern division and was firm in his conviction that the only police protection necessary in the northern area was that which the Provincial Police had offered to supply.

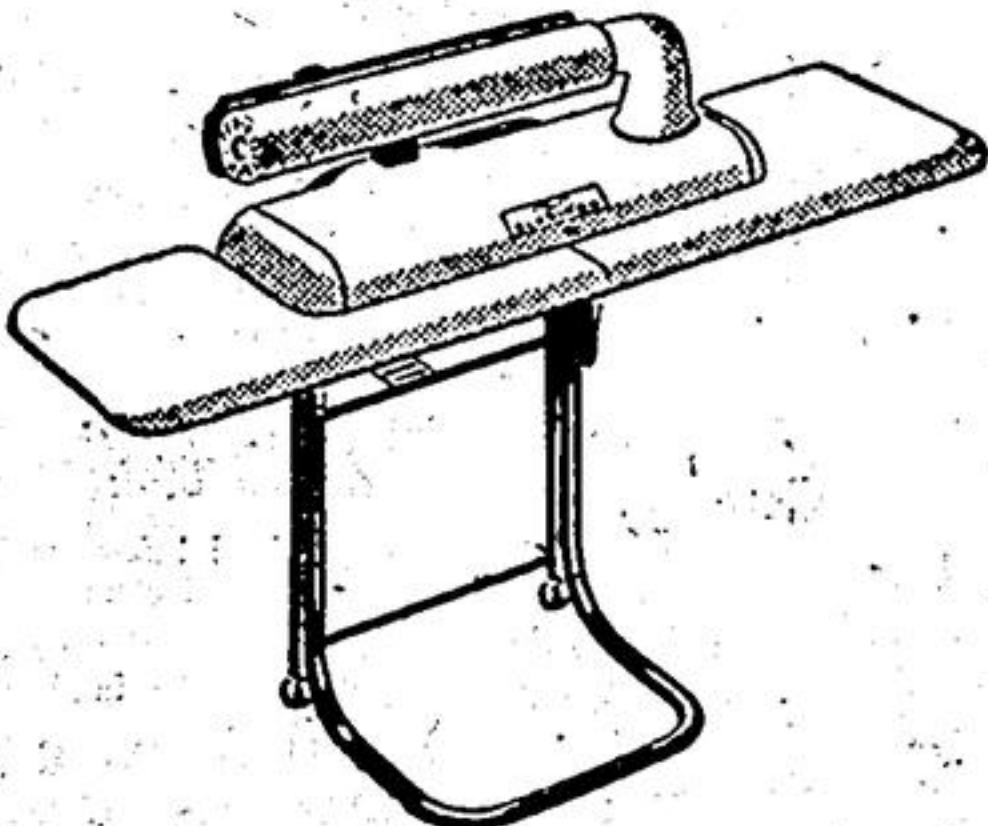
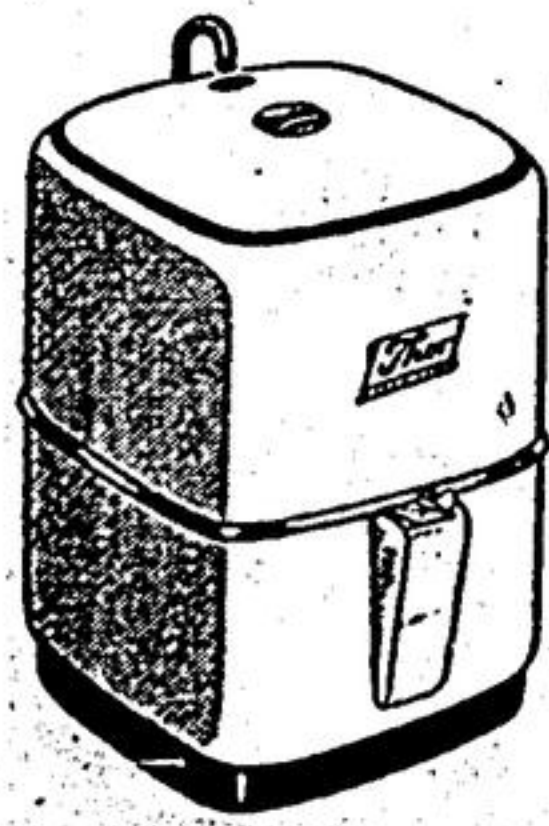
