Ontario County Roads Good

No serious objections to the present conditions of the County Roads were voiced at the September meeting of Ontario County Council Wednesday and it would seem that all the rural councillors are fairly well satisfied with road conditions. Various road matters were taken up at the morning session at the Court House in Whitby.

Several members of council took exception to the fact that the county road mechanic, W. Porter, resides in Oshawa while he is employed at the garage in Sunderland. More specifically, they thought that he should not be allowed to use the county truck for transportation daily, although it was said in explanation that he is required frequently to bring parts from Oshawa. The employee has stated that he is not prepared at the present time to move to Sunderland, but councillors feel that since this village is the centre of operations, he should be available there, as a condition of his employment.

Members discussed the value of spraying of roadside weeds and brush as a means of keeping the shoulders cleared. Chairman of the Road Board Thomas Harding, agreed that the spraying is very expensive and a long way from being totally effective.

"Two mowers properly handled would do what we want—I would

not give ten cents for the spraying," said Reeve Harding. He also noted that an acre of turnips belonging to a county farmer, had been damaged because spraying was done when the wind was blowing.

At its morning session, council dealt with a volume of correspondence, mostly of a routine nature.

On the matter of the increased indigent rate (\$5.) which was authorized, it was learned that the new rate has not yet gone into effect. Most minor municipalities have endorsed the move, but the Township of Scott and its Reeve Albert Thaxter, object.

Ten months after the appointment of the county assessor, official approval of his appointment was received from Max Sloan, assistant supervisor of assessment, Queen's Park.

Reeve Garnet Wilson of Canning asked that something be done to curb speeding from Saginaw into his village. He said that recently a small child was knocked 70 feet by a speeder, had both legs broken and skull fractured.

No action will be taken this year on building a new bridge over the creek on the Brock Road, Pickering Township, just north of highway No. 2, although the approaches to the bridge have been improved.

Register Convictions In Vaughan Twp. Building Case

Six additional residents of Vaughan Township have been convicted in the municipality's continuing drive against infractions of its building by-law. The convictions bring the number of cases in which the township has taken legal action to fifteen.

Prosecutions have been successful in every case launched by the township. In the recent batch, tried in York County Police Court by Magistrate O. M. Martin, each offender against the by-laws pleaded guilty. One, a second case, was fined \$20 and costs. He had been charged with living in temporary accommodation in January, 1950, and fined \$10 and costs at that time. The other five cases, against which the same charge was laid, were disposed of by fines in three cases and a remand for sentence until the end of November for the other two in order to give them an opportunity of correcting the situation.

All cases, in which charges were laid by Vaughan's building inspector Charles Miller, have been in contravention of by-laws for some considerable time, it was revealed. They have been warned repeatedly since the summer of 1948, Mr. Miller said.

Voice of Prophecy Bible Questions And Answers

Question—Will you give some references on the subject of anti-christ?

Answers—Daniel 7:25; 2 Thessalonians 2:3-8; Revelation 13:5-8.

Q.—Have not the martyrs of the old days gone to their reward?

A.—"And these all, having obtained a good report through faith, received not the promise: God having provided some better thing for us, that they without us should not be made perfect." Hebrews 11:39, 40.

Q.—Why did Jesus die for us?

A.—He died for our sins (1 Corinthians 15:3); and "the wages of sin is death." Romans 6:23.

Q.—If we have faith, do we need doctrine?

A.—"Take heed unto thyself, and unto the doctrine; continue in them: for in doing this thou shalt both save thyself, and them that hear thee." 1 Timothy 4:16.

Q.—Where is the text that says a man breaks all the commandments if he breaks one?

A.—James 2:10: "For whosoever shall keep the whole law, and yet offend in one point, he is guilty of all."

Q.—The Bible speaks of lions in Palestine, but there are none there. How about it?

A.—They are not there now; but they were there anciently, when the country was largely wooded. 1 Samuel 17:34; Jeremiah 5:6; 12:8; Nahum 2:12; and many other references.

Q.—Someone told me that Moses could not have written any books of the Bible because writing was unknown in his day.

A.—Your informant is fifty years behind the times. Actual letters, inscriptions, and even whole libraries from Moses' time, and long before, have been discovered. See any good up-to-date book on Biblical archaeology or any modern encyclopedia. Christ said that Moses wrote. (See John 5:46.)

Q.—Does the Bible teach an actual bodily resurrection of the dead?

A.—It does. Isaiah 26:19: "Thy dead men shall live, together with my dead body shall they arise." Ezekiel 37:12: "I will open your graves, and cause you to come up out of your graves." John 5:28, 29: "All that are in the graves shall hear His voice, and shall come forth." Acts 24:15: "And have hope toward God, which they themselves also allow, that there shall be a resurrection of the dead, both of the just and unjust."

Q.—Hasn't research proved the origin of life to be contrary to the Bible record?

A.—Prof. George Darwin, president of the British Association, and son of the renowned Charles Darwin, said at a public meeting of the Association on August 16, 1905, "The mystery of life remains as impenetrable as ever." As far as science is concerned, this statement still holds. The Bible tells us that God created the living from the non-living. Read all of the first chapter of Genesis; also Psalm 36:9: "For with thee is the fountain of life: in Thy light shall we see light."

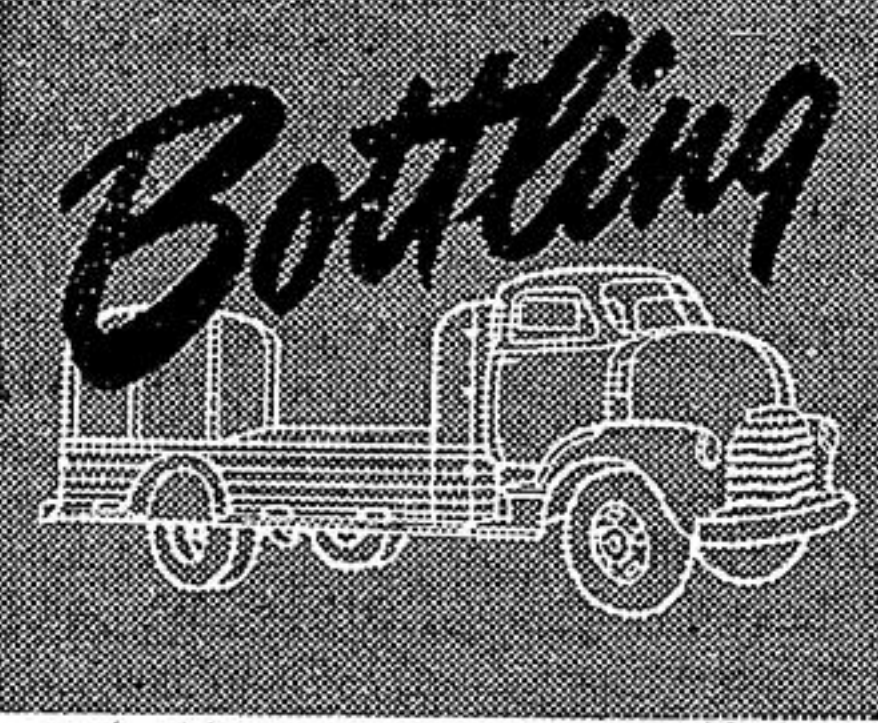
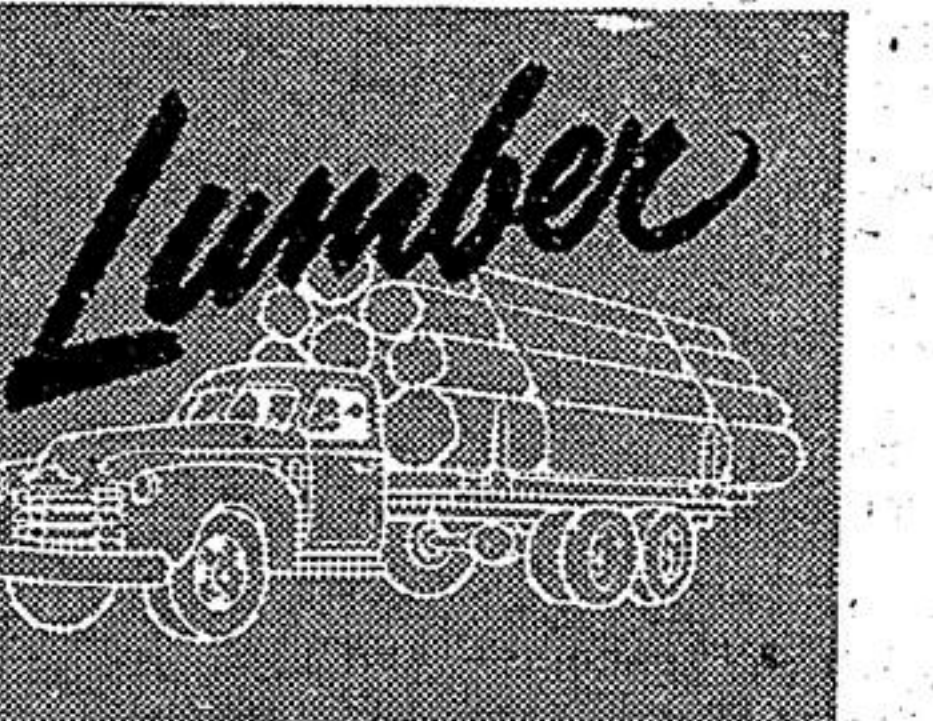
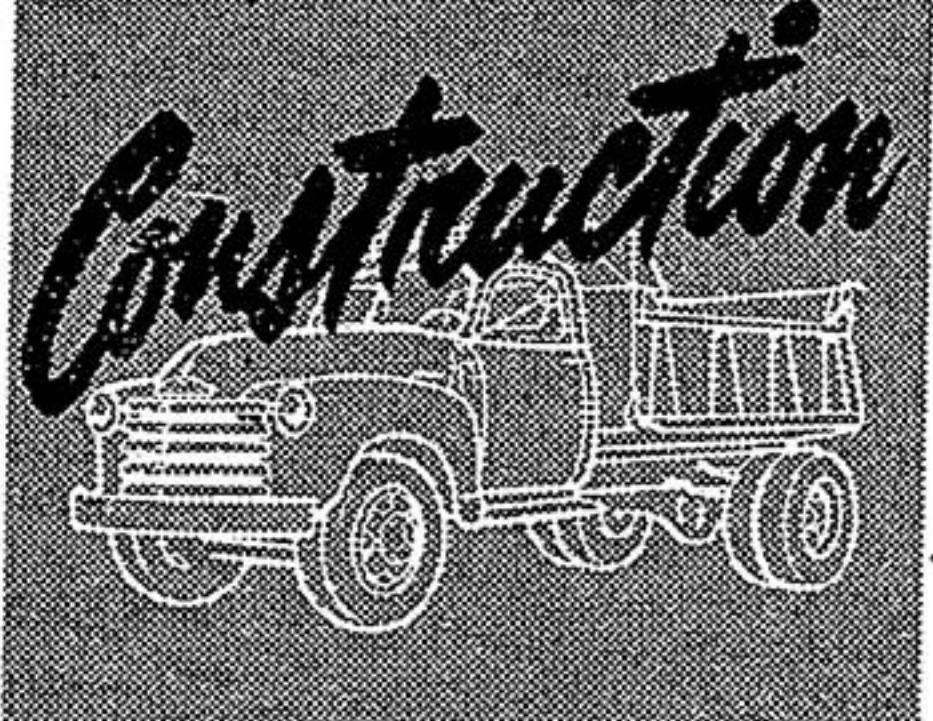
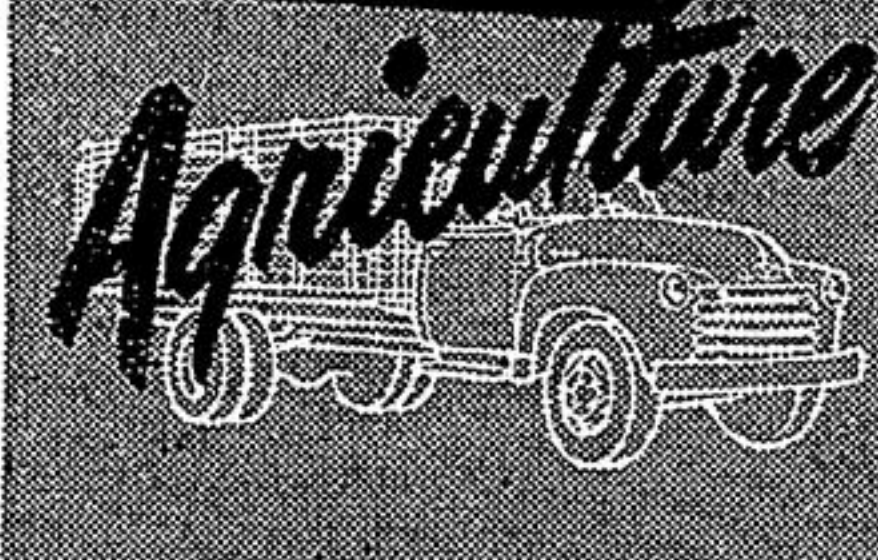
BURIES BROTHER AND THEN DIES

A few hours after he attended the funeral of his brother, John Thomson, 63, died early Sunday morning at Agincourt.

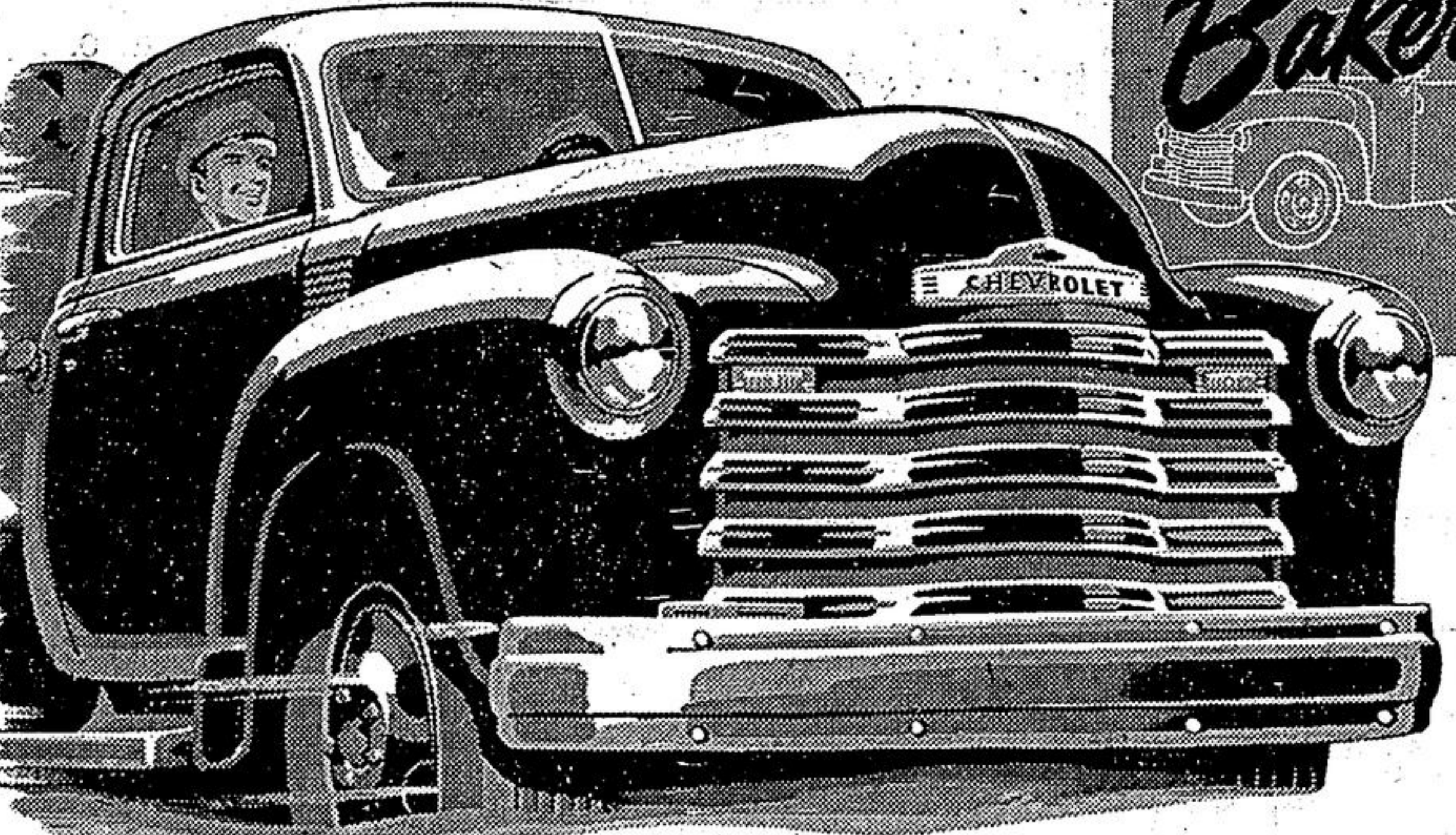
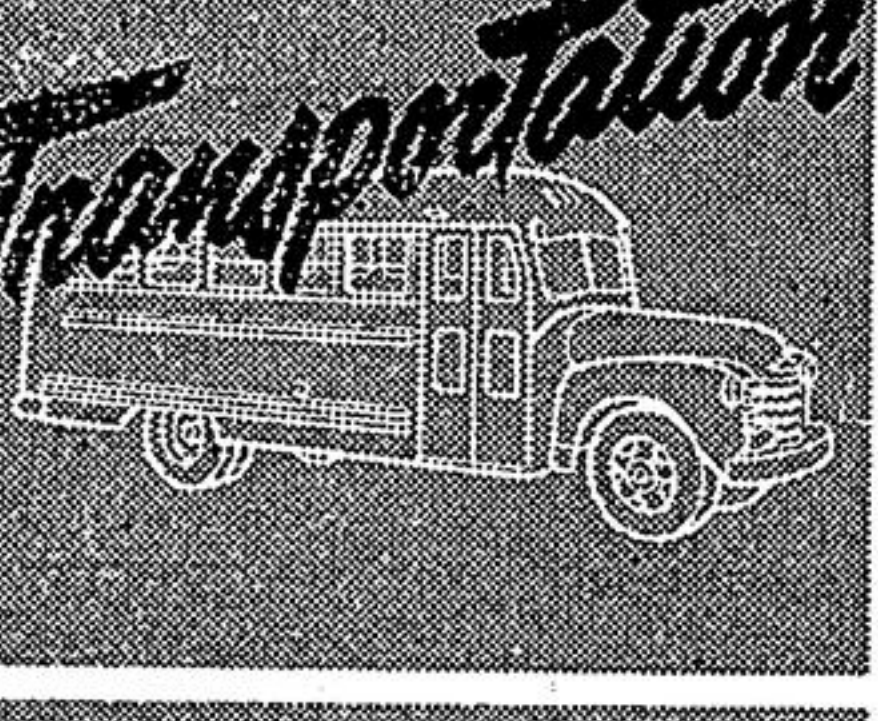
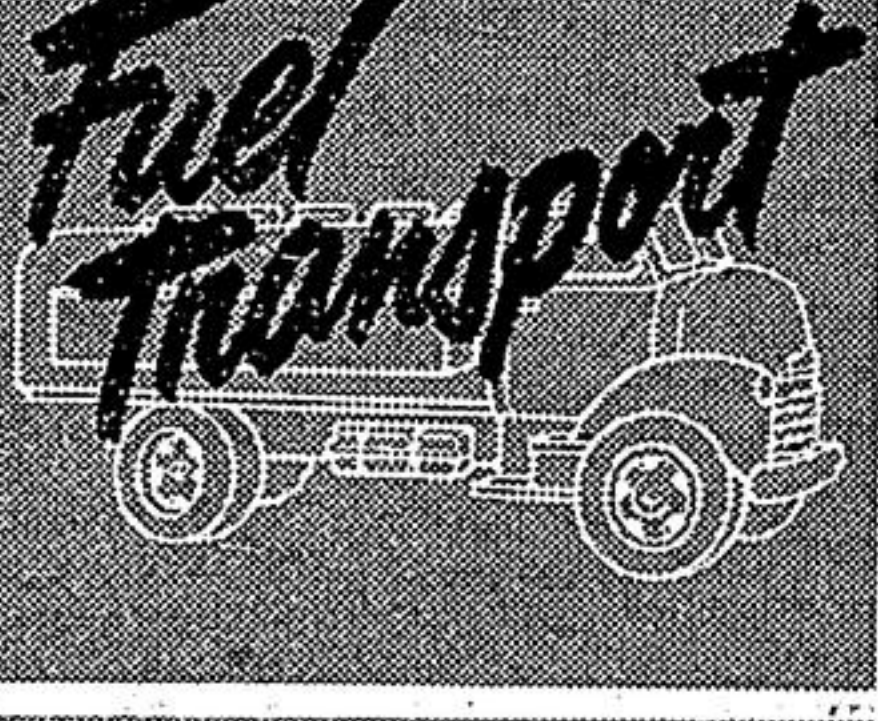
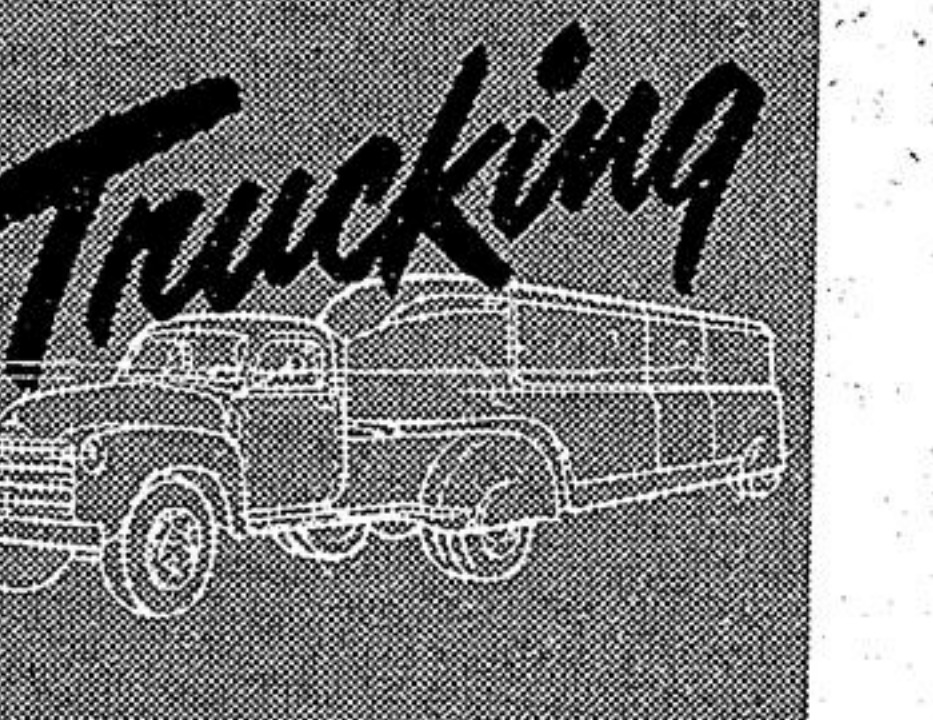
