



In 1944 a copy of a resolution was forwarded to the Officer Commanding the Irish Regiment of Canada moving that the members of the Council of the County of York expressed its pride and appreciation of the fine work being done by the members of the Irish Regiment of Canada in the Italian campaign particularly in view of the fact that a large proportion of the Irish Regiment personnel was from the County of York.

The same year the County Council petitioned the Dominion Government to grant special sixty day harvest leave to experienced farm workers among the soldiers on duty in Canada. In order to harvest a record crop of hay and grain five hundred would be required in the County of York alone.

DeHaviland Aircrafts of Canada, Ltd. requested that Dufferin St between Sheppard and Wilson Avenues be closed to permit the company to extend its runways. A diversionary road, one-half mile east, would be constructed and maintained by the Dominion Government.

The sum of \$43,300 was divided by County Council in 1945, among the organizations carrying on patriotic work.


