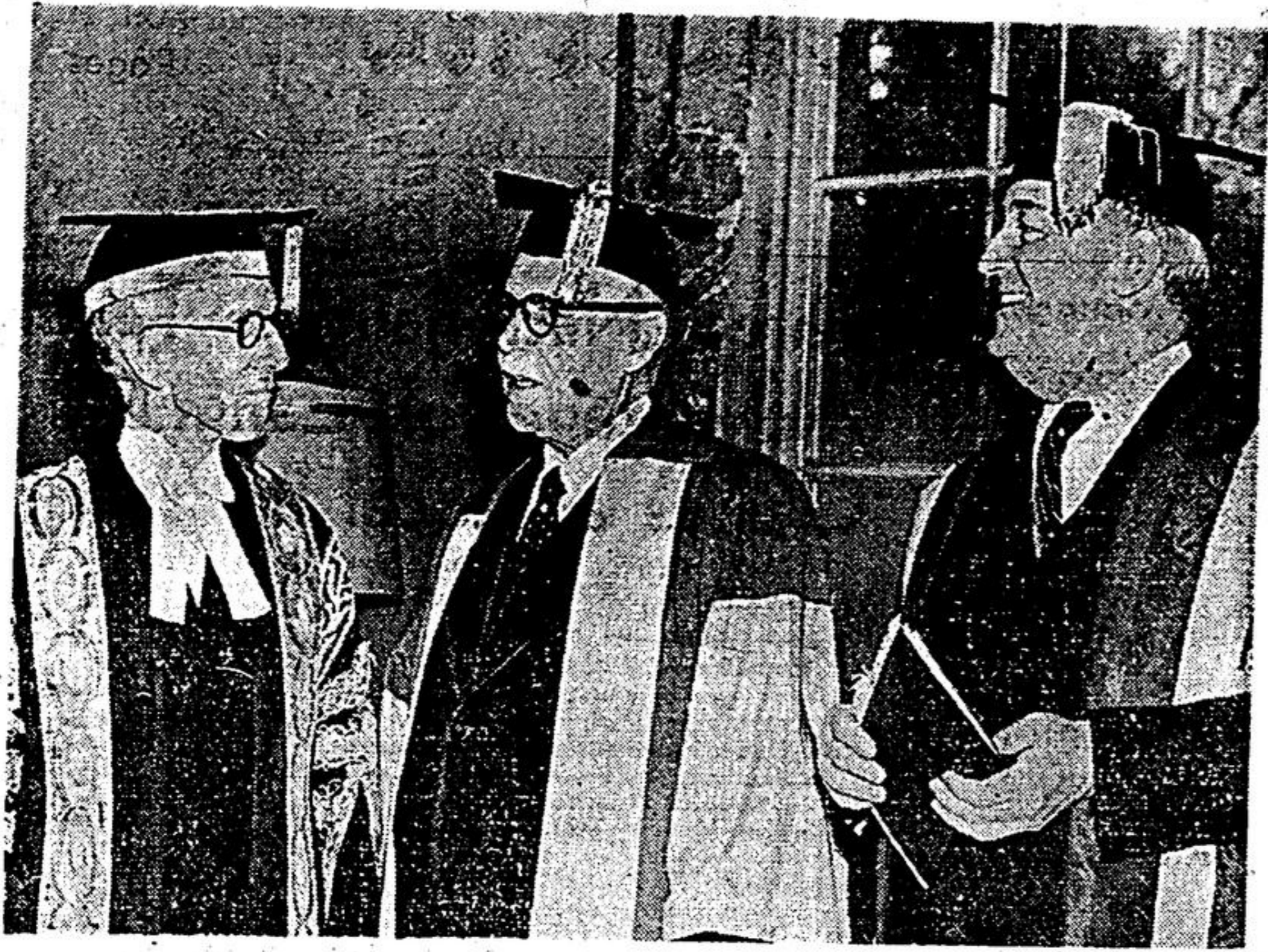


**Preparedness Only First Step, St. Laurent Warns Convocation**

**Dies from Injuries In Weekend Crash**

W. Lloyd Elmsley of Lake Wilcox died Monday in Toronto Western hospital from injuries received over the weekend when his car was involved in a collision on No. 11 highway, two miles south of Aurora.

Three persons, including Elmsley, who received a crushed chest, were hurt. The car, police said, crashed into a fruit truck.

Chief Coroner Dr. Smirle Lawson is investigating.

**Found at Night with Guns and Light, Charged Under Hunting Act**

Two Greenock Township men appeared before Magistrate Otto McClevis in police court at Walkerton last Thursday to explain why they were carrying firearms during a closed deer season and having a spotlight in their possession.

One of the accused, Jack Mullin of Chepstow, was charged with having in his possession, a firearm, not encased or dismantled, in an automobile, contrary to the Game and Fish Act.

The other gun-toter, Albin Bester, also of Chepstow, was charged with having in his possession during the closed season for deer, a device capable of casting light, and a rifle, contrary to section 29 of the Game and Fish Act.

Two conservation officers told the court that they had found Bester and Mullin near Chepstow at 12.10 a.m. with their rifles and spotlight rigged with a battery in their possession. The accused who was carrying the light was in a field at the time his partner was approached by the two officers; he then ran for the bushes where he hid until commanded half a dozen times to come out into the clearing. After this evidence from the conservation authorities had been heard, the case was adjourned for a week. Mullin also faces a charge of obstructing an officer in the performance of his duty.

**Homemaking School Sponsored by W.I.**

A training school for leaders of Homemaking Clubs in York County was held last Monday and Tuesday, October 30th and 31st, in the board room of the Department of Agriculture, Newmarket. This training school is sponsored by the Women's Institute Branch of the Department of Agriculture and leadership was given for the new fall project, "Working with Wool."

Twenty-three leaders, representing twelve clubs, were present.

Mrs. Marion Montgomery of Toronto, and Miss Ruth Hunt, Home Economist for York County, were in charge of the training school and instruction was given in the organization of Homemaking Clubs in communities, as well as practical instruction in the choice and care of woollen material.

Every step in the construction of a wool skirt was shown. The leaders will now organize local clubs in their community of girls between the ages of 12 and 26 and a series of meetings will be held where the girls will learn what wool is; how to know it from other fabrics; how to choose the material and how to handle and press it. Each girl will make a skirt, with a weskit if she wishes or a jumper. She will also learn something about choosing the colour and design of the material and how to use a pattern as she does so. When she has completed her work, each girl will exhibit at and participate in an Achievement day held in the spring.

**Many Candidates For Aurora Club**

**Potato Yield at New High**

C. H. Chapman of Nipissing grew an estimated 897 bushels of potatoes per acre to achieve the highest yield yet to be officially recorded in the Province of Ontario. This was announced at the banquet of the Parry Sound 600 Bushel Potato Club by R. E. Goodin, Assistant Director of the Crops Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Chapman is a member of this Club, and the average yield for the 17 growers who took part was 653 bushels per acre. This compares with an estimated average production for the whole Province of 190 bushels per acre.
