Mrs. Eva Hare of Markham Succumbs To Heart Ailment

Mrs. Eva J. Hare, widow of David Hare who predeceased her some nine years ago, passed away at her home in Markham on Wednesday, Nov. 1st, from a heart ailment following an illness of three days' duration. Mrs. Hare had been in poor health for several years, and was in her 71st year. Funeral service was held in St. Andrew's United Church, Markham, on Saturday, Nov. 4th, conducted by Revs. Thomas and Berry of Markham, with interment in Elmwood Cemetery, Markham. Pallbearers were nephews of the deceased.

Frank Warwick, Victim Of Street Car Accident, Passes in Toronto

Struck by a street car as he was leaving work in Toronto on Tuesday afternoon, Oct. 31st, Frank Warwick of John St., Thornhill, succumbed to his injuries the following day in St. Joseph's Hospital, Toronto. Mr. Warwick suffered a severe skull fracture. He was in his 49th year. His wife, the former Pearl Baker, survives him. They had no family. Three brothers also survive.
