

### **Bulk of Pickering Assessment Appeals Only Minor**

Although there were thirty-five appeals registered against the assessment roll of the Township of Pickering, the largest percentage of them were only of a minor nature. Seven of the appellants appeared before the court held at Brougham on Thursday morning. A total of \$7,100 was the reduction on the entire appeal slate. The largest deduction was on the Joe Makouchik place in the 3rd concession. Mr. Makouchik's assessment was \$9,575 on a very large dwelling. The court felt that the owner was being penalized for having this very large home which he could not make use of, and reduced his assessment under the over-built clause. Two of the assessments appealed were believed by the court to be too low and were consequently raised.
