2/3 cup boiling water

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift together three times. Add lemon rind to egg yolks and beat until thick and light. Add 1/2 cup sugar gradually, beating constantly. Beat egg whites with flat wire whisk or rotary egg beater until light and foamy throughout; add remaining 3/4 cup sugar very gradually and continue beating until stiff enough to hold up in definite, satiny peaks. Add vanilla. Add boiling water to egg yolks, stirring well; then add flour all at once and beat with spoon until smooth. Fold quickly into egg whites. Turn into ungreased 9-inch tube pan and bake in slow oven (325 deg. F.) 1 hour, or until done. Invert pan 1 hour, or until cold.


