CHAMPION SPONGE CAKE

- 1 1/4 cups sifted Swans Down Cake Flour
- 1 1/4 tspns. Calumet Baking Powder
- 1/4 tspn. salt
- 1 tspn. grated lemon rind
- 4 egg yolks
- 1 1/4 cups sugar
- 4 egg whites
- 1 tspn. vanilla
- 2/3 cup boiling water

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift together three times. Add lemon rind to egg yolks and beat until thick and light. Add 1/2 cup sugar gradually, beating constantly. Beat egg whites with flat wire whisk, rotary egg beater until light and foamy throughout; add remaining 3/4 cup sugar very gradually and continue beating until stiff enough to hold up in definite, satiny peaks. Add vanilla. Add boiling water to egg yolks, stirring well; then add flour all at once and beat with spoon until smooth. Fold quickly into egg whites. Turn into ungreased 9-inch tube pan and bake in slow oven (325 deg. F.) 1 hour, or until done. Invert pan 1 hour, or until cold.

Court of Revision Hears 13 Appeals In Whitchurch Twp.

A total of thirteen appeals against the 1951 assessment roll were heard in Whitchurch Township on Saturday afternoon, at the annual Court of Revision. Of the thirteen appeals, total reduction amounted to \$500.00.

A. H. Kirby, lot 4 and 5 on the west side of the township appealed against a total assessment on land and building of \$25,000. Mr. Kirby has some 68 small cottages, in addition to a booth, farm house and club house.

"You're only assessed about \$175 each for the cottages," Assessor Fred Cummings told Mr. Kirby.

"We're not complaining so much about the buildings, as on the land; there's too much of a spread between the assessment on lot 4 and 5," said Mr. Kirby.

It was revealed that over \$2,000 in rent was realized from the land in the case.

After some discussion, court reduced the land assessment by \$500.

L. Playter of Toronto appealed \$400 assessment on 50 acres, west half of the east half of lot 23, con. 5. Court sustained assessment.

Mrs. E. Weiler, Toronto, appealed assessment of \$500 on land and buildings, lot 14 and 13, plan 288; R. Townsend, Wilcox sub-division claimed his lots were under water all the year round and the bridge was out. His assessment was \$300 on buildings. Both these assessments were sustained.

A. Stephen, Wilcox Lake, appealed his levy but the assessor's figure was sustained. It was revealed that Mr. Stephens was paying about \$30 in taxes, while \$400 in revenue was being derived from his property.

B. Garrett, Musselman's Lake, appealed against his \$400 assessment. Taxes on the place are \$16.54. Council sustained the assessment.

Mrs. W. J. Hill, lot 12, east of the 7th on the north townline, appealed against a \$200 assessment on 10 acres, sustained.

D. Dearnley, Wilcox Lake, appealed his \$550 assessment carrying taxes of \$35. He claimed it was only a short time ago the taxes were only \$18 and nothing had been done to justify the increase. Council sustained the assessment.

W. Devitt, Ringwood, appealed an assessment of \$500 on a house just north of the corners. The assessor stated that Mr. Devitt had recently erected a new garage on the place, while in addition his assessment was only high enough to cover a summer cottage. Council sustained the figure.

John Coling's assessment at lot 26, Wilcox Lake, was sustained, as was that of Jacob Vanek, another lake resident. Mr. Vanek's assessment was \$3,600 and the assessor stated that an increase of \$500 had recently been placed on his buildings. It was stated that Mr. Vanek derived \$12,000 in rentals from his several houses.

An appeal by Mrs. E. Walker on a \$500 assessment was not altered by council.

F. L. Ray, lot 61 in the 1st concession appealed an assessment of \$750 on 22 acres of land and \$150 on his dwelling which was an abandoned street-car. The latter assessment he claimed was more than one hundred percent of the purchase price.

Mr. Ray's property was very desirably situated, the assessor declared, and some lots in that area were selling as high as \$1500 and \$2000. The assessment was sustained.

Miss L. E. Parker, lot 2, Wilcox Lake, appealed an assessment of \$200 which she claimed she did not own. This case will be investigated by the assessor.

Yonge Transportation Adding to Markham General Funds

The latest report just issued by the North Yonge Street Bus service reveals that for the January to September period, the Township of Markham received \$2,659. Richmond Hill also received a nice nest egg in the amount of \$5,561, which amounts have been added to the local general funds.

While this profit is down from the corresponding period last year, the amounts are nevertheless, a nice bit of revenue for the municipalities involved.

Total profit for the period was \$24,180, as against \$30,256 in 1949. The drop in revenue is attributed to extra miles operated and greater costs.

First Guernseys To Mexico

The most important sale ever to be made by Canadian Guernsey breeders was completed recently by Jack Fraser, Fraserdale Farms, Concord, when he sold a carload of 20 bred heifers and one bull to the Mexican Government.

This is the first shipment of purebred Guernseys to be made to Mexico from Canada and the importance of this first shipment cannot be over-emphasized as it will undoubtedly lead to future shipments.

Dr. Jose Figueroa and Mr. Federico Sanchez, Technical Advisors to the Mexican Department of Agriculture, working in co-operation with Hays Limited, Oakville, made the selections.

The entire female group were daughters of the two top breeding Fraserdale herd sires, Hominy Hill Admiral and Churn Creek Valor's Merrymaker, both of which have won honours in the show ring themselves and have sired outstanding individuals which show uniformly good type and which give every indication of being high producers.

The young herd sire going with these females is Don Alda Ideal Victor, the son of Don Alda Victor's Bonnie, Grand Champion at the C.N.E. in 1948 and 1949, and Reserve Grand in 1950. Bonnie has a three year old record of 12,904 lbs. of milk and 629 lbs. of fat, made on twice a day milking. He is sired by Don Alda Viscount Archie, Junior Champion at the C.N.E. in 1948 and Reserve Senior and Reserve Grand in 1949. Archie
