HEALTH GRANTS GIVEN PEEL, YORK

Federal grants amounting to \$36,500 have been made to health units in York and Peel counties. The Health Department announced a \$25,500 grant will go to York County to pay 50 per cent of the operating cost of a health unit in 1950-51.

The unit will operate in 11 rural

and suburban municipalities, developing immunization programs against contagious disease, prenatal and baby clinics and checking water for purity. For Peel County, \$11,000 will include a preventive dental service with the health unit already in operation.

OBITUARY

Frank Warwick of 40 John St., Thornhill who passed away recently at St. Joseph's Hospital, Toronto, was fatally injured the day previous, while on his way home after leaving work at 4:30 p.m. Crossing Queen Street near Noble Street, he was struck by an east-bound street car. Mr. Warwick was employed in the shipping warehouse of the Boeckh Brush Co., Toronto, with whom he served for over 20 years. The funeral was conducted on Saturday, Nov. 11th, from his home, where Rev. A. T. Gooding and Rev. M. Bricker participated, and at the Gormley United Missionary Church, where Rev. L. K. Sider, the pastor, was assisted by Rev. F. Huson and Rev. H. Shantz. Special music was provided by the Herderson Sisters. Pall bearers were Messrs. E. Fisher and G. Billierman of Thornhill, Mr. R. Mansbridge, Richmond Hill, and D. Baker, F. Harvey and A. Doner of Gormley. Interment was at Heise Hill Cemetery.
