## Pickering Farmer And Lawyer New


**Ontario** Leader Walter C. Thomson last Friday was elected leader of the Liberal Party in Ontario. The tall, ruddyfaced lawyer-farmer from Pickering, who now is federal member of parliament for Ontario constituency, won on the third ballot. He led on both preceding ballots. On the first, when the vote was split among eight candidates, he was only 74 short of the clear majority required.

A surprise of the convention was the strong run made by Dr. Harry M. Cassidy, head of the University of Toronto's school of social work. Dr. Cassidy, a political unknown and a last-minute entrant in the leadership race; was second.
