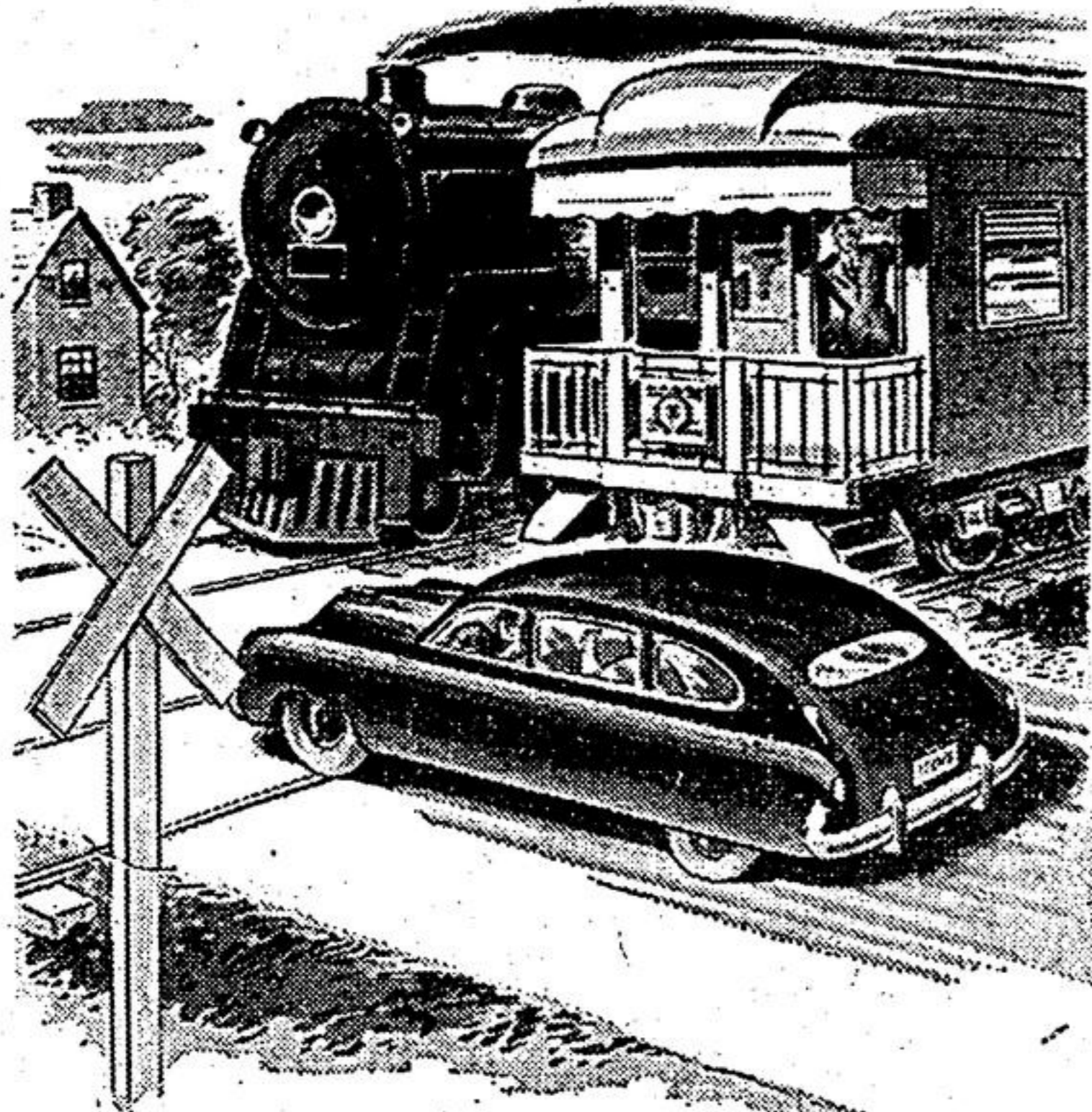


DON'T HAVE A SINGLE TRACK MIND ON A DOUBLE TRACK RAILROAD!



IT PAYS TO WAIT!

Many railway crossings have more than one track, which multiplies the hazard to the motorist and makes the need for caution doubly great. The drawing above emphasizes one of the prime dangers of the multiple-track crossing—the train on the farther track obscured by the train moving in the opposite direction on the near track. This motorist would have saved himself trouble if he had waited a second or two to see if the farther track was clear before proceeding. The Board of Transport Commissioners for Canada received reports of 443 railway crossing accidents in the 12-month period ended June 30th last. These accidents took 140 lives, and injured 549 others. In some cases motorists disregarded protective devices placed at crossings for their protection, and in others disregard of the basic rules of safe driving was responsible for needless loss of life and injury.

POT LUCK

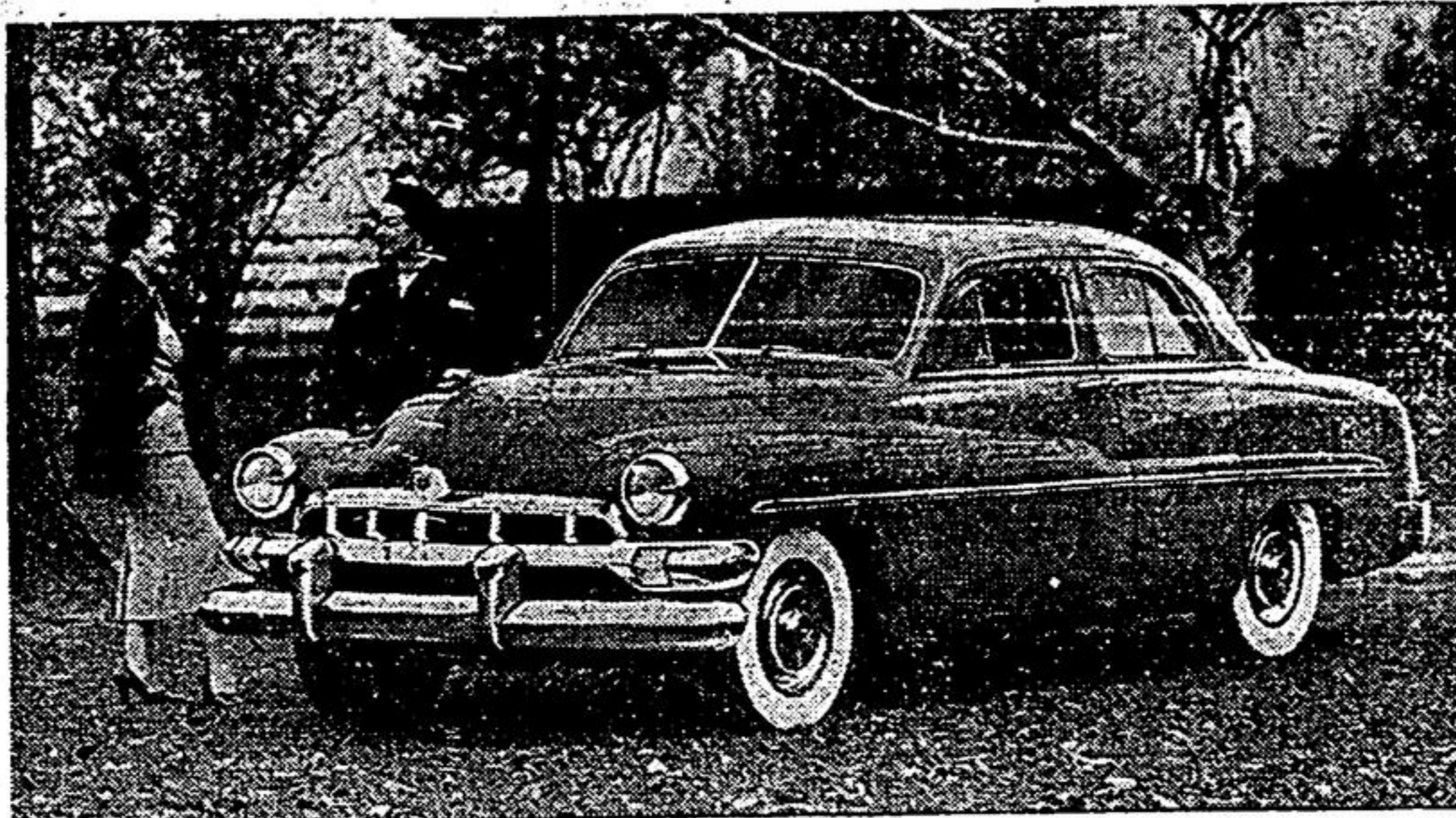

'51 Monarch On Display At Eastside Motors



While retaining certain basic identifying features, the 1951 Monarch passenger cars which were shown the Canadian public for the first time on Nov. 10 incorporate distinctly new body styling features which are immediately noticeable in front and rear end contours.

The 1951 model's 112 h.p. V-type eight cylinder engine has a number of mechanical revisions designed to provide quieter, more efficient performance.

Rear end styling is completely changed, starting with an enlarged rear view window which is 185 square inches greater in expanse than that of previous models. The new, fin-like fenders extend well beyond the luggage compartment to blend with a more massive, wrap-around bumper. Tail lights, of vertical design, fit into the new pattern and hub caps are fashioned in keeping with the new body lines.

A massive chrome grille, bumper and head lamp assembly features a new, horizontal grille bar of wrap-around design which gives a double-bumper effect. Over-all, the 1951 Monarch has a lower, longer appearance.

A choice of five solid enamel and four metallic enamel exterior colors is offered, as well as several two-tone combinations. There is also a wide field of selection in upholstery combinations.
