of the Royal Winter Fair, was unveiled Tuesday morning by His Excellency Viscount Alexander of Tunis, Governor-General of Canada, in the rotunda of the office of the Royal Winter Fair. The Rt. Hon. James J. Gardiner, Minister of Agriculture for Canada, delivered a brief address prior to the unveiling, paying tribute to the great contribution the late Mr. Dryden had made to Canadian agriculture.
