## Clippers Blow a Win with Flood of Cheap Penalties

After taking a two goal lead in the first period and holding it throughout the second the Clippers received a couple of fateful penalties in the closing minutes of the game to let the Millionaires tie the score with only seconds left to play. The Junior threesome for Markham known as the "Kid Line" were the big guns all the way sniping three of the six markers and being dangerous on every rush. For the locals the two hard-hitting defence pair of Nick Bangay and Hochberg turned in terrific performances shaking up the opposing forwards on many occasions. Up front Minton showed well with a goal and two assists. Gibson also was a top marksman with two goals. Rhodes held the fort on every clear shot with all six tallies being netted from scrambles in which his view was blocked. Penalties were numerous and played an important part in the scoring. A few flare ups and fistic encounters which always occur in a hard fought game were quickly broken up by the referees who ruled the game with a firm hand.

The Clippers opened the scoring at 1:10 with Gibson banging in a low shot from Minton. The Millionaires recovered themselves and burst in on Rhodes but the stinky netminder came up with a great save. A matter of minutes later Stark flew down the wing, centred out to McCrone who in turn relayed the rubber to Sayliss. He made no mistake and tucked the puck in the corner to put his team two up. At 4:55 with Sayliss serving time Minton pole checked his man and sped down alone to grab the loose puck and blink the light for goal number three. With only three minutes remaining in the period Galan, Clements and Gray, newcomers to the Markham squad, combined to beat Rhodes on a close in play.

In the second period Stouffville received two penalties and Markham turned on the pressure. N. Bangay, Hochberg and Gibson went out to defend the fort and put on a great display of defensive work. Bangay and Hochberg form about the best blueline two some possible as attacking players sprawled and bounced from their solid bodychecks. At 6:42 Markham tallied with Galan again putting his team in the running from Clements and Gray. Less than a minute later Gibson let go with a bullet shot from the blue line after Minton and Hochberg had started the play. At 9:30 Clarke led the attack for the Clippers through the entire length of the ice and set up McCrone who sank the rubber behind Stunden. At the midway mark in the game Gibson of Markham tallied from Sluce and Brennan to beat Rhodes unassisted to put the Millionaires within one goal of the high flying Clippers. The last goal was hotly disputed as Rhodes claimed the puck had not gone over the goal line. Fans sitting directly back of the net also claimed it was no goal but the word of the goal judge decided the issue. Determined to get that one back N. Bangay fired a rising shot into the top corner from the blue line which Stunden never moved on. The period ended with the Clippers still holding a two goal lead.

The third period was more of a defensive twenty minutes for the Clippers as they tried to retain their two goal advantage. Baker of Markham received the only major penalty of the game for combing Couch with his stick. He later had a misconduct added to his five minute detention in the cooler. At 15:30 with Couch off Galan fired his third marker assisted by his linemates Clements and Gray. With only a minute and a half remaining Coach Robinson pulled Stunden from the net for an extra forward. Previous to this move Stark was banished for a two minute penalty and Nick Bangay received a match misconduct for pushing the ref. around. With only three players on the ice facing a full Markham squad plus an extra forward a face-off was called in the Clipper's end. In a wild scramble around their goal Gibson of Markham banged in the loose puck with H. Forgie and Singleton picking up assists. The goal came at 19:21, a matter of seconds before the end of the game. It was a great third period comeback for the Millionaire squad and should produce plenty of interest for Wednesday night's contest when these two rivals face one another again.
