In declining health for some years, but bedfast less than a week, one of Stouffville's most familiar citizens passed to his rest early Tuesday morning, Dec. 12th, at his home on Clark St., in the person of John W. Gower, who had been active until his \$2nd birthday.

Born in Headcorn near London, England, \$1 years ago last March, he was the son of John Gower and Maria Manning Gower. The deceased came to Canada at the age of 22, and settled in Markham Township, and his mother lived in Stoufiville for a time.
