Ontario Beef Cattle Show and Bull Sale

While the 1951 Beef Cattle Show and Bull Sale for Ontario, scheduled for March 20th, 1951, is over three months away, all entries for this event must be made on or before January 20th. This reminder comes from W. P. Watson, Livestock Commissioner for Ontario and it is to him that the entries must be sent. He also acts as Secretary for the Ontario Beef Cattle Improvement Association under whose auspices the show and sale is held.

Mr. Watson urges both prospective sellers and buyers of beef bulls to keep the sale in mind, since he considers it is one of the best places to either buy or sell such animals in Ontario. The financial assistance offered by the Ontario Department of Agriculture on bulls bought by Ontario farmers at this sale is a help to both parties. It amounts to one-third of the purchase price, up to a maximum of \$150 assistance per bull.

This assistance to Ontario farmers in purchasing the high quality bulls offered at the sale, means it provides a real opportunity for them to get a really good sire for their beef herd at a reasonable price. For the seller, it helps assure a good auction sale where his surplus purebred breeding stock can be sold to the highest bidder.

The location of the sale on March 20, 1951 is the Royal Winter Fair Building, Coliseum, Exhibition Grounds, Toronto, as it has been in the past. While the date is some time ahead, Mr. Watson again reminds the breeders who wish to enter bulls in this show and sale that their entries must be in his hands by January 20, 1951. High Yield Potato Clubs

Quality was a big feature in the seventeen High Yield Potato Clubs organized in Ontario this year, according to R. E. Goodin, Assistant Director of the Crops Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture. As an indication of the interest in these clubs, Mr. Goodin points out that 313 growers took part in them, which gives an average membership per club of 20 persons.

All of them had high goals. Fifteen clubs were shooting at a production of 500 bushels per acre and one had 600 bushels per acre as its goal. The seventeenth did not set specific production goal, but was simply aiming at potato improvement.

These goals seem high in relation to a Provincial average yield of 192 bushels per acre, but the over-all result of the competitions show they were none too high. The average yield achieved by the growers taking part was 425 bushels per acre and the top producers this season had nearly twice that yield from their special plots. C. H. Chapman of Nippissing in the Parry Sound District was top man with an estimated yield of 897 bushels per acre, and two other growers had yields above the 800 bushel mark. Nearly twenty per cent of the growers taking part exceeded the 500 bushel objective adopted by the majority of the clubs.

These clubs are sponsored and organized by the County and District Branches of the Ontario Crop Improvement Association but in addition special incentive was added by local areas or organizations. In North Simcoe several crop competitions were joint projects of the local Agricultural Societies and the County Crop Improvement Association. Then the potato-growing areas of Dufferin, Middlesex, Peel, Parry Sound and South Simcoe gave substantial prizes for quality. This was not only on the basis of marketable tubers per acre, but, in some cases, for preparation of exhibits and for condition of potatoes in storage. Another interesting feature of this eighth year of these High Yield Potato Clubs is that this year's average production is the highest recorded so far. From a variety standpoint, it is worth noting that twelve of this year's prize winners grew Chippewas, with Katahdins standing next in line from the standpoint of yield and quality.

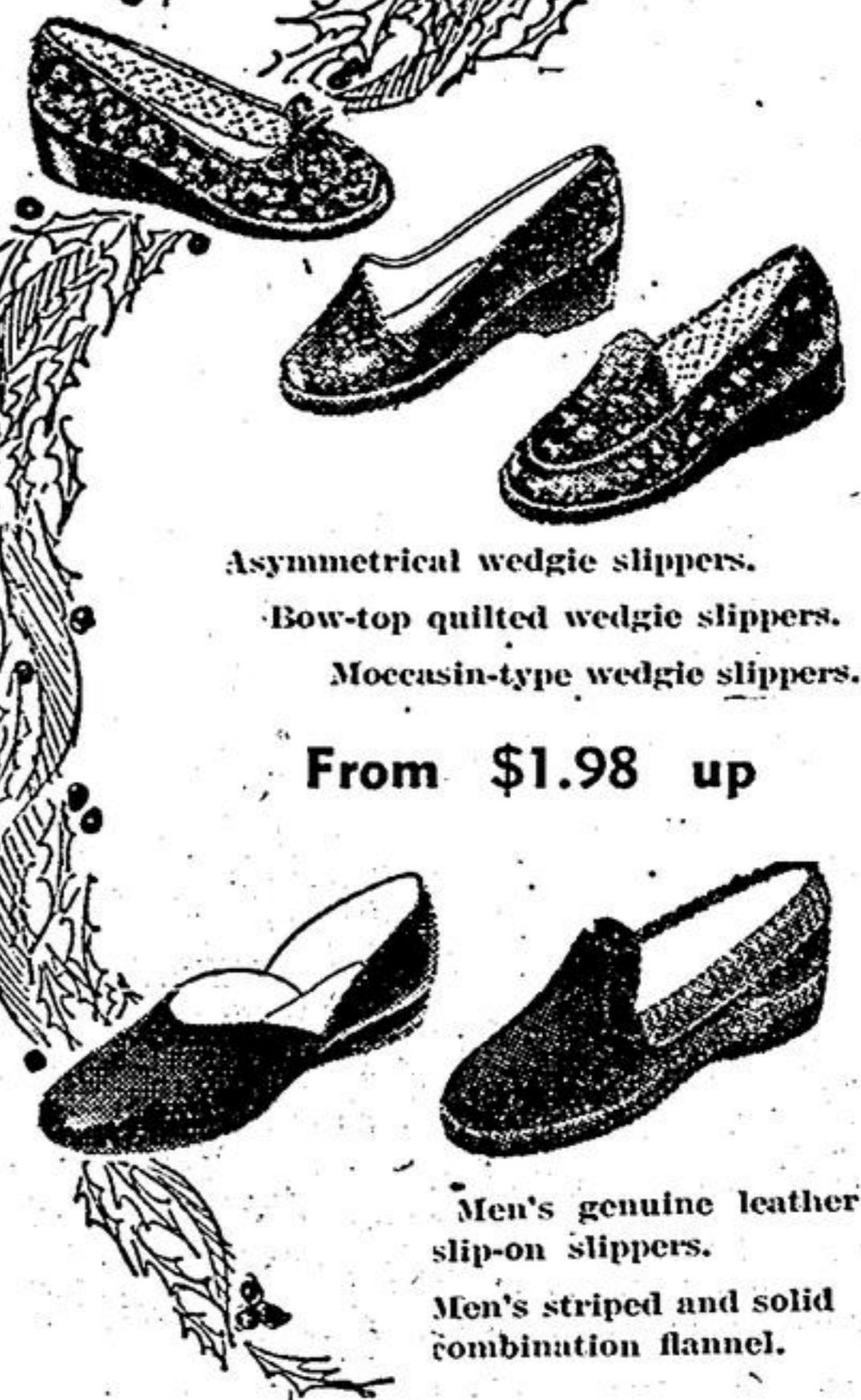

New House of Commons Boasts Unique Lighting

One of the most complicated large-scale illumination projects was shown to the public for the first time when the new House of Commons was recently opened in London. Employing the latest lighting techniques and equipment, skilled engineers accomplished the mammoth installation in such a way that it does not detract in the slightest from the traditional atmosphere of the previous House of Commons which was destroyed by fire in the bombing raids of 1941. The result is generally acknowledged by all who have seen it to be an engineering and artistic achievement of unusual merit.

Lighting of the Main Chamber, and adjacent offices, lobbies, committee rooms and halls was undertaken by The General Electric

Co., Ltd. of England, the largest manufacturer of illuminating and electrical equipment in the British Commonwealth. Engineers of this company, represented in Canada by its subsidiary, British General Electric Co., (Canadian) Ltd., worked closely with the architect in charge of the rebuilding project, Sir Giles Gilbert Scott.

The outstanding features of the lighting system are most apparent in the Main Chamber where the complete absence of any visible lighting fixtures or units is immediately noticeable. All lighting units are hidden thus enhancing the traditional antique appearance of the great room. Despite the fact that they are invisible, more than 1800 fittings and 4,000 lamps — most of them of the fluorescent type — were used in the project.

The main lighting of the Chamber is entirely by means of fluorescent lamps, both hot and cold cathode, all of which are controlled by a dimming system that enables the illumination to be

increased gradually to the level desired so that Members are not disturbed by the sudden switching on of the lamps.

The principal source of lighting in the Chamber is provided by 15 cold cathode units mounted in the ceiling above a laylight. The five main panels of the laylight are each subdivided into 30 smaller panels, and the whole laylight and its subdivisions is framed in carved oak. A cold cathode unit is mounted behind every ceiling panel. The glazing of the panels is tinted oak colour so that by day the whole roof appears to be of timber, with carved ornamentation.

Control of the Chamber lighting is normally effected from the Engineer's Control Room in the basement of the House. Push-button switches for remote control of the motor-driven dimmers are mounted on a panel beside the Engineer's desk, enabling the illumination to be increased or decreased as necessary.
