The Ontario County Crop Improvement Association carried out a very large and well organized program during 1950. There were 132 different co-operators and 267 acres under test.

Dr. J. R. Weir, Field Husbandry Department, O.A.C., Guelph, was the guest speaker. He spoke on the importance of forage crops in live stock feeding.

Mr. Olding, Soils Department, O.A.C., Guelph, gave a very interesting illustrated talk on the soil survey that has recently been completed in Ontario County.

Mr. Jack Ketcheson, Soils Department, spoke on farm planning.

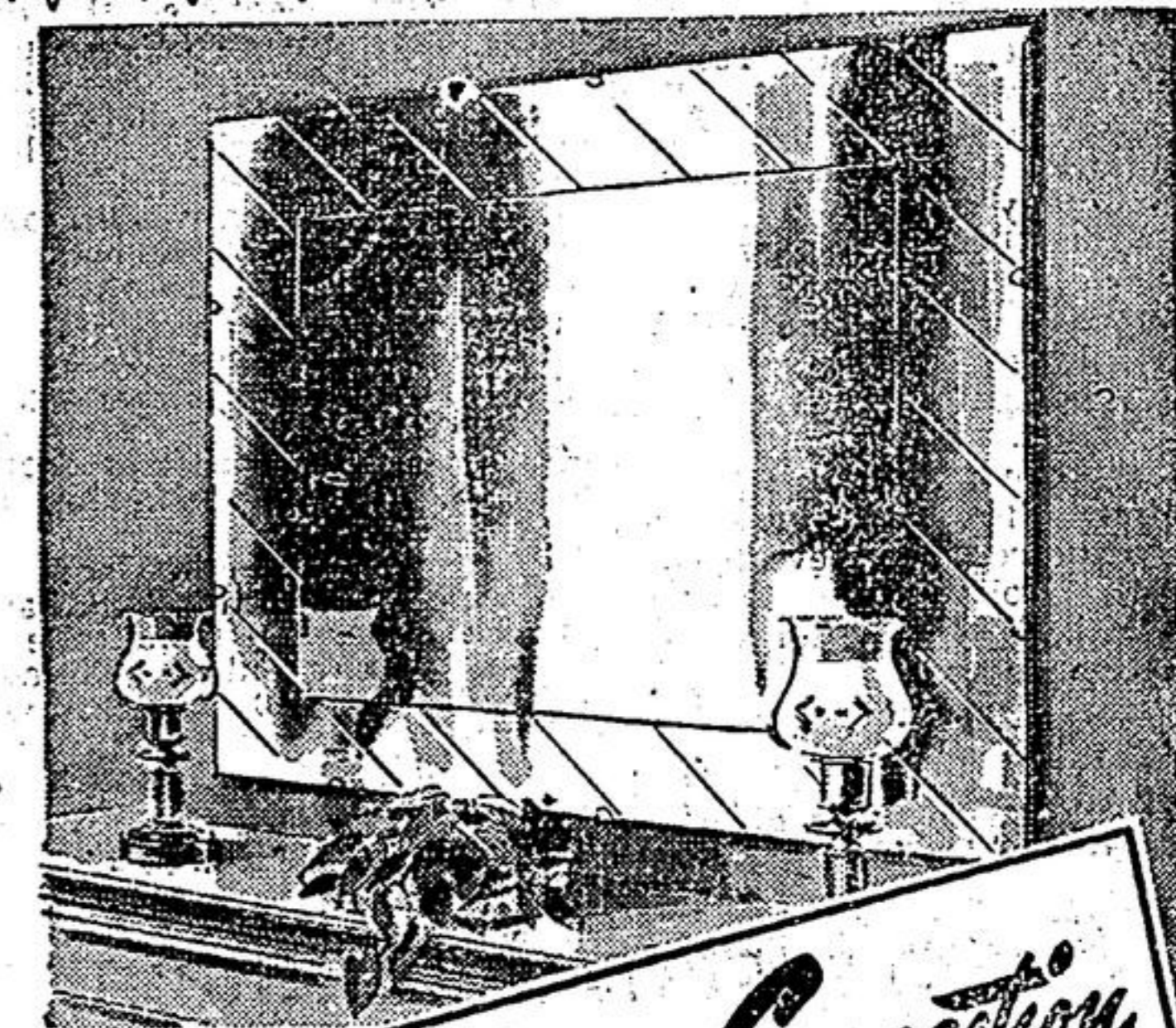

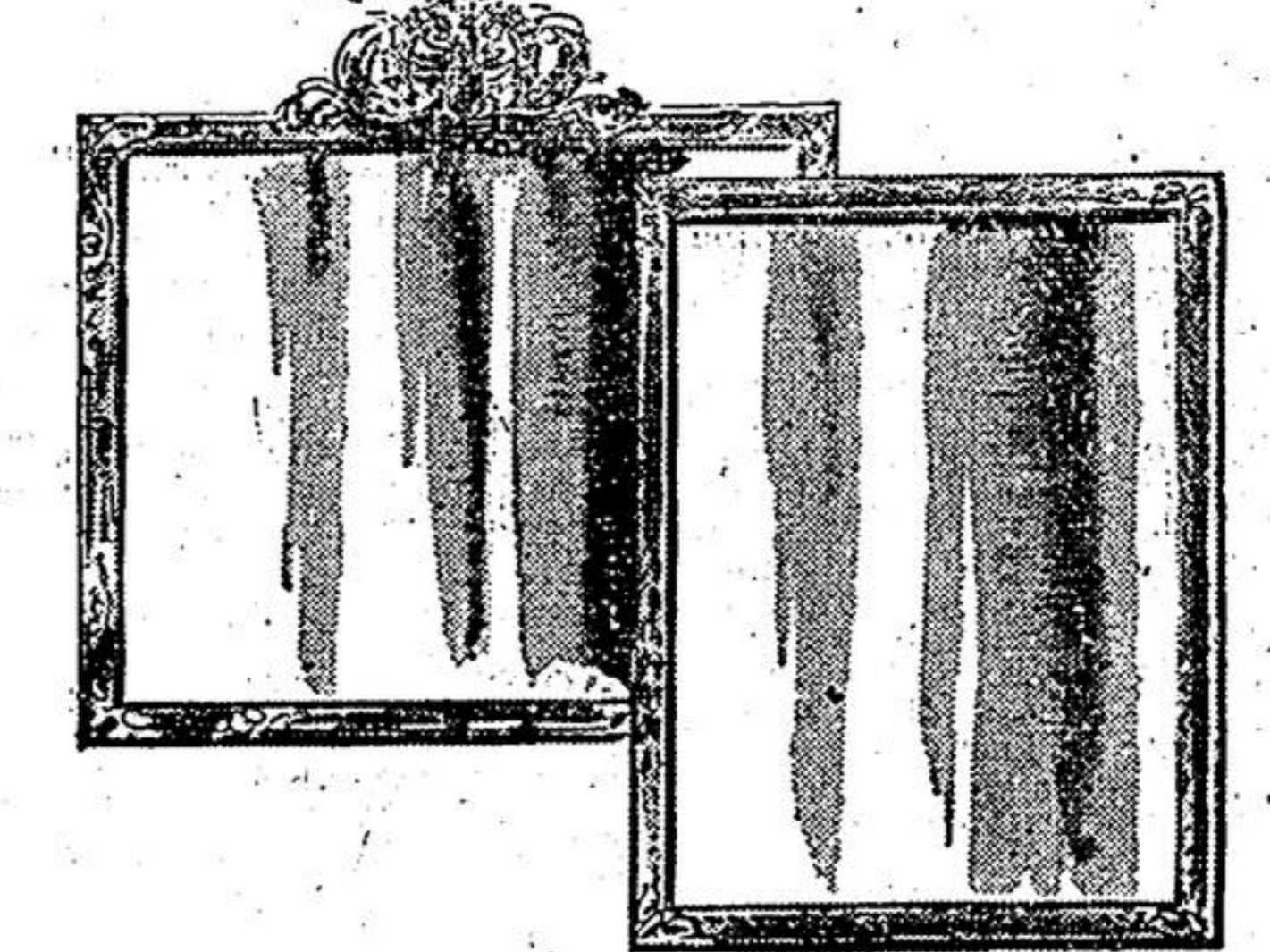
