York Crop Men To Meet at Newmarket
The annual meeting of the York County Crop Improvement Association, one of the largest gatherings of York farmers, is to be held in the Parish Hall, Newmarket, on Friday of next week, January 5th, when the programme will feature soil types, uses and conservation with discussions on various other aspects of crop improvement.
Chief speaker for the day will be D. W. Hoffman who is at present attached to the Soils Department of the Ontario Agricultural College and during the past summer covered many York fares in charge of the county soil survey. Also on the programme will be J. W. Suggett of the Chemical Research Department of the Ontario Hydro Commission who will give a short address on chemical killers for year round application; and will answer questions on preserving fence posts and other wood products.
High yield contests have been conducted in wheat, potatoes and corn and soybeans and some of the prize winners will discuss methods used in producing their crops. To balance up the programme a discussion period will be held on harvesting methods including the use of forage harvesters.
With the enviable reputation this organization has for commencing on time there will again be a free draw for attractive door prizes at 10.30. It would be well to be on hand a little earlier and get your overshoes buckled to your overcoat before that time. At noon a free lunch will be served to all present. This is a real farm crops forum and every farmer is cordially invited to attend and participate in the discussion.

back to the township. He recalled in one year \$90,000 was appropriated for 10 miles of road. "It costs between \$6,000 and \$7,000 a mile to grade, ditch and build up a road," he stated. He felt the cost of some roads was beyond the township.

"I'm not criticizing the council, but I think a lighter truck is more economical. I think this old truck should have been traded in sooner," Mr. Ball stated. To this Reeve Catherwood replied the idea was to use the new truck more for snowplowing, and use the old truck for lighter, summer work.

Horace Johnston complained about the way they are trying to drain Goodwood. "I say the Road Superintendent should either clean the ditches out, or have someone else clean them out," he offered.

William Hewlett, nominated for trustee, believed criticism of a public body is good. "When criticism brings something out into the open, you often see another aspect of the problem you didn't know about, that made the person act as he did," Mr. Hewlett declared.

The matter of weed-cutting was brought before the meeting. Reeve Catherwood said it was very difficult to obtain someone to cut weeds, and it was expensive. Someone suggested other townships hired tractors, Whitchurch for instance. Reeve Baxter of Scott Township stated they did considerable spraying of weeds, but it was too early to know how successful they had been. He stated wild carrot and chicory were difficult to kill.
