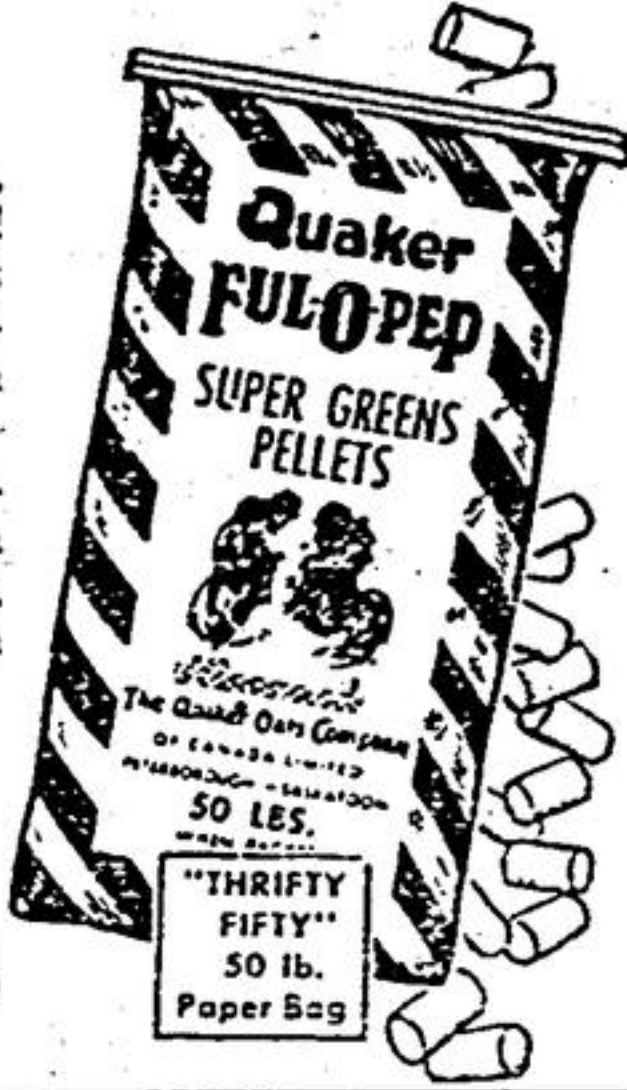

### Coin Collector Gets Deluge of Inquiries

Alexander Watt, Kitchener coin collector, 214 Queen St. South, has been deluged with telephone calls and letters following publication of an article about his hobby. The article appeared originally in the Kitchener Daily News Record and last week in The Tribune.

According to the story, 1936 nickels, dimes and quarters, possessed a greater value than that shown on them. This should have read 1936 pennies, dimes and quarters.

Many readers also apparently missed a further statement in the article concerning a small punch mark on the coins that makes them valuable. This was the entire point in determining their value.

As stated in the first article, some of these 1936 coins were minted in 1937 due to a shortage of dies. To mark the different year, a small punch was made on the coins.

There are a great many 1936 coins in circulation but unless they have the punch mark they have no special value, Mr. Watt pointed out.

Several people brought coins to The Tribune which would have been valuable if the punch mark had been present. These people said they had failed to notice the paragraph about the mark.

The story contained one other inaccuracy: 1889 dimes, not one-cent pieces, are scarce and therefore valuable.
