(continued from front page) 1951," explained Mr. Tindall. Councillor Luther Booth agreed that since the township had the necessary equipment bought and paid for they were now in a position to move ahead in the coming year. Councillor John Ball said that he did not believe that the \$70,000 cut in assessment for the Township of Reach was a fair deal in comparison with the assessment figures for Uxbridge. In commenting on the road conditions Mr. Ball claimed that the council had not received many complaints and he believed that with some extra gravel this year the roads would be in the best shape. Councillor Bruce Beach expressed his opinion that more damage was done to the roads in the early part of the year by drawing gravel with trucks to repair them. Mr. Beach said that the township would be farther ahead if they purchased a tractor and loader for pit work as well as a mower for roadside weed cutting. "We must invest money to make money," quoted Mr. Beach. The School Board members Wm. Hewlett, Walter Beach, Eldred Catherwood and Mr. Pickett reviewed the activities of the board in their first year as a group. In bringing the nomination meeting to a close Reeve Catherwood impressed upon his audience the importance of casting their ballot both in the election of the 1952 council and the hospital question.
