These mares with their foals at their side will be vanned to Kentucky to be bred along with two other mares owned by Hatch. Twenty Thirty is going to the court of Jet Pilot, a Kentucky Derby winner. Ascendant and Mrs. Gibson will be bred to Ace Admiral. Mazzarine will be mated to Teddy's Comet and Fleet Mink to Hold All.

**United Church Insures Ministers**

The United Church of Canada is the first religious group in Canada to establish a group insurance plan for its ministers. Dr. Harry Tuttle, secretary of the Department of Pensions of The United Church of Canada, told the annual meeting of his Board, held in Toronto.

Dr. Tuttle said that, out of 1,933 eligible ministers up to 68 years of age, 1,747 have been insured. Ten Canadian insurance companies are carrying the policies. Each insured member pays a premium of \$12 annually. The United Church of Canada, acting as employer, is paying the employer's portion of the premium, which is \$25,000.00 for 1952.

Group hospitalization is the next plan under consideration by the Department of Pensions of the United Church of Canada.

**Combination of Industrial and Residential Areas Creates Problems for Markham Twp.**

"Does Markham Township desire industry or not?" demanded Councillor Charles Hooper at the regular meeting of Markham Twp. Council on Monday night.

"We want industry, but undesirable industry in residential areas should not be allowed," explained Councillor LeMasurier. "It is necessary that there should be such industries as glue factories and tanneries in the township but let them locate somewhere else."

The discussion arose when Mr. Fenn, real estate agent, appeared before council requesting an explanation on why certain industries could not be set up adjacent to the railroad in an area extending from John Street at Thornhill on the south to Bayview on the east to No. 7 highway on the north.

The council endeavoured to explain that residents in the area were demanding that undesirable industry not be allowed entry into the residential district.

"It is only natural that industry would desire to build near a railroad," commented Councillor Hooper, "a railroad is for industry

so I don't understand why people want to build homes there in the first place."

"We want industry, as long as it is clean," argued Councillor LeMasurier.

"There is no co-operation," continued Councillor Hooper, "we go ahead and invite industry, then we refuse to let them in."

Councillor Hooper suggested that the council look over the situation to see what could be done. The council felt that although there had been much opposition by a number of the ratepayers to certain types of industry setting up within the area it would hardly be fair to consider those who were living a distance of from a half to one mile away.

Clerk Charles Hoover explained to Mr. Fenn that the area extending from Thornhill to Langstaff and stretching considerable distance east is regarded at the present time as residential and although the council is sympathetic there is nothing they can do about it. Mr. Hoover continued that there was an amendment on the books to change this ruling.


