A pet canary was credited with saving the lives of three teenagers, when the screeching bird aroused them in time to escape their burning home in their night clothes.

The three children of Mr. and Mrs. William King of Rosebank, Pickering Twp., Gwen 16, Ronnie 14 and Grant 13, were in bed at the time. Ronnie woke to hear the bird's screeches.

"When I heard Pete, I knew there was something wrong," he said. "I could smell smoke and I woke Gwen and Grant. The fire was going strong in the kitchen."

The three children ran to a neighbour's who summoned Pickering and Southwest fire area companies. The house was an inferno in minutes. A washer and four kitchen chairs were all that were saved.

"I checked the two stoves carefully before we went out," Mr. King, a Toronto painter said. He estimated the loss of his 5-roomed cottage and belongings at \$8,000, partly covered by insurance.

"The children never wake at night," said Mrs. King. "If it hadn't been for Pete they would not be here today."

Overheated pipes were blamed for the fire.
