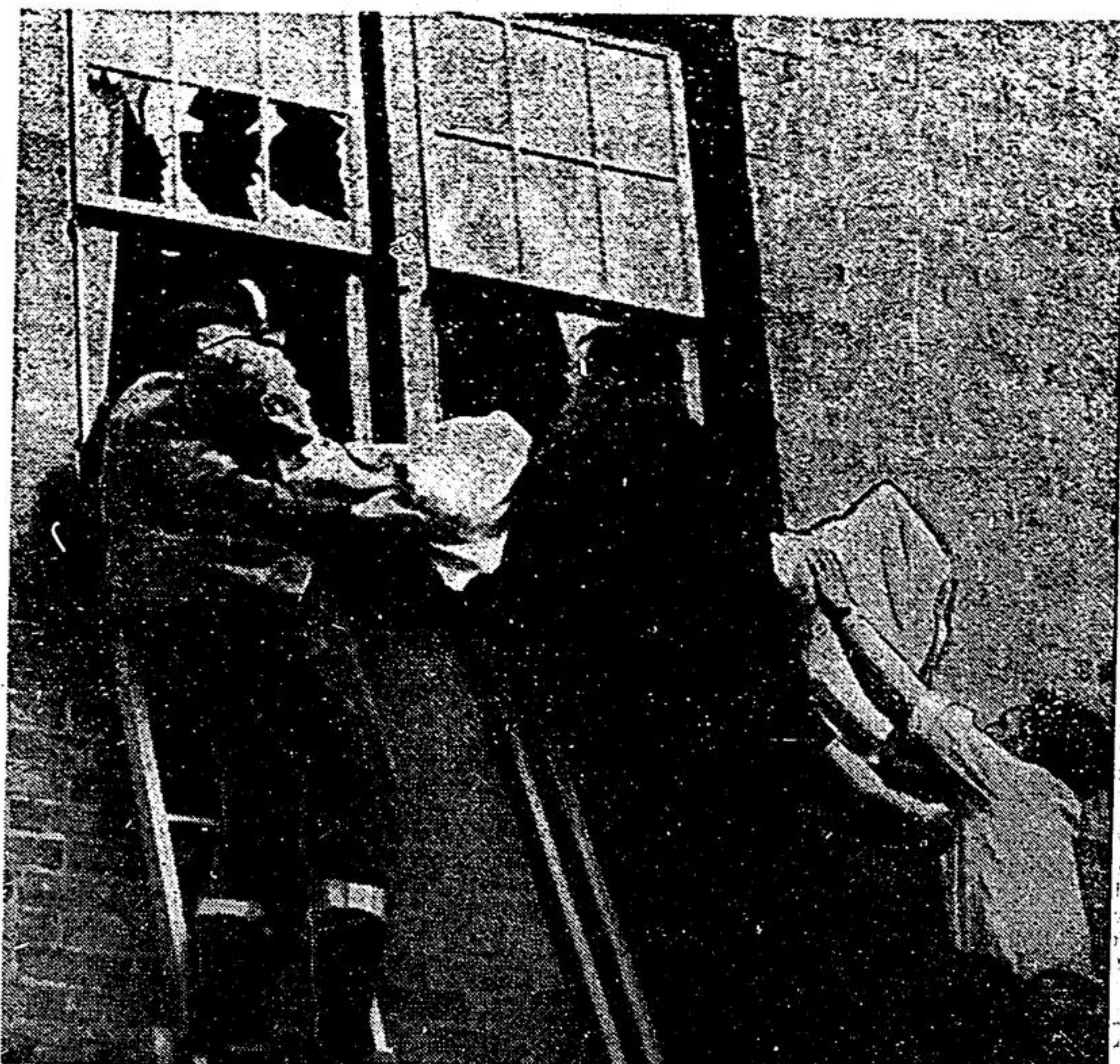

Interesting Letter From Stouffville In Bermuda

The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital, Bermuda, March 26, 1952
 You will find enclosed my cheque to cover another year's subscription to The Tribune. I am receiving my papers regularly and certainly look forward to reading them.

This little island is a lovely spot with its perfect weather, beautiful flowers and foliage. The principle Bermuda flowers are hibiscus, bougainvillea, poinciana, morning glory, night blooming cereus, oleander, passion flower, the Bird-of-Paradise, poinsettia and right now, fields and fields of the Bermuda Easter lilies. We had some cooler weather during February and March but just overnight we have lovely warm days again, averaging 72 degrees. The sun is very hot—I mean to say, one burns much more quickly here than in Canada and fifteen or twenty minutes in the water is just about long enough. Our off-duty time is all spent out of doors and we have a wonderful time bicycling all over the island on our Mobyettes, which are motor-assisted bicycles and a real necessity here since the roads are very hilly.

Last Sunday I had the pleasure of touring the island in a seaplane which took forty-five minutes and cost \$22.60 or \$6.00 American money. It is a worth while trip even though you fly in the coloring of the water and reefs is really a sight and I am hoping my coloured pictures do justice to it.

All in all, this is a wonderful spot to spend, at least, a few months and you have a complete change.

Our hospital here is a busy one and I am enjoying my work as night supervisor.
