Under the auspices of the Ontario County Crop Improvement Association, the thirteenth Annual County Seed Fair was held in the gymnasium of the Port Perry High School Saturday.

H. L. Fair of Uxbridge, secretary-treasurer of the Ontario County Crop Improvement Association, was the first speaker of the afternoon. Mr. Fair was followed by Tom Dickenson of Ottawa, who was the guest speaker. Mr. Dickenson gave a most informative address on "Grass Silage."

The next address was that of T. W. Brennan, Canadian Department of Agriculture, Toronto, who acted as seed judge for the fair. Following addresses were given by George R. McLaughlin, Oshawa, President of the Ontario Crop Improvement Association; Alex Davidson, Agincourt, who led the Panel Discussion on Grass Silage vs Corn Silage; Ken Fallis, Toronto of Fieldman's Crops, Seeds, and Weed Branch, Ontario Department of Agriculture, and Les Smith, Port Perry, the first vice-president of the Ontario Crop Improvement Association.
