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Mennonites Plan Church-wide Sunday School Convention

Plans for a fourth, church-wide, Sunday School Convention this summer, have been announced by J. J. Hostetler, Canton, Ohio, Secretary of Sunday Schools for the Mennonite Commission for Christian Education and Young People's Work. The Convention is to be held in the new Union Auditorium on the campus of Goshen College, Goshen, Indiana, August 21-24, 1952. The evening sessions of the convention will be held in connection with the Brunk Brother's Evangelistic Campaign, scheduled for the Goshen area during August.

This fourth Convention is sponsored by the Mennonite Commission for Christian Education and Young People's Work. It is under the direction of a special Convention Committee consisting of J. J. Hostetler, Paul Lederach, Scottsdale, Pennsylvania, and Roy S. Koch, St. Jacobs, Ontario. The first three Mennonite church-wide Sunday School conferences were held approximately sixty years ago. The first one was held at the Clinton Frame Church, near Goshen, Indiana, in 1892; the second one at the Zion Church near Bluffton, Ohio, in 1893; and the third one at the Forks Church, near Middlebury, Indiana, in 1894. These general Sunday School conferences were then discontinued in favor of local and district meetings of workers. In recent years there has been sentiment and interest in favor of again having a general and church-wide convention.

Locally the Convention is sponsored by a conjoint committee representing Goshen College, the College congregation, and the Indiana-Michigan Mennonite Christian Worker's Conference. This committee consists of E. E. Miller, president of the College, chairman; Leland Bachman, business manager of the College, secretary; John H. Rosemann, pastor of the College church; Paul M. Miller, chairman of the Indiana-Michigan Christian Worker's Conference; and Ernest Banett, member of the Conference Executive Committee. Local committees are being formed to take care of the various needs for the entertainment of the convention.

Plans include the display and demonstrations of various items and organizations of the Mennonite Church whose products and services make a contribution to the promotion of the Sunday School work. These displays and booths will be found in the spacious lobby of the Union building on the campus. Some of the best methods and materials for use in Sunday Schools will be exhibited. The convention program is centered on the theme: "The Church at Work Through the Sunday School." Sunday School workers and leaders, specialists in their fields, will speak and participate in the activities of the convention. Editors and writers of Sunday School materials, teachers

from Mennonite church schools, and pastors of churches, will be present to share in the work and serve as sectional and group leaders.

Delegates to the convention will be recognized who are members of local Sunday Schools and who qualify by registering. Hundreds of delegates are expected from nearly all states of the Union, Canada, and foreign countries where missions have been established. All sessions and sectional meetings will be open to the public; however, workers are requested to register in order to receive the convention materials.

Suggests Sweepstake To Help Out Newmarket Hospital

A miniature Irish Sweepstake, to raise funds for the York County Hospital, now \$50,000 overdrafted at its bank, was proposed by staff doctor M. D. Tuchtie, president of the York County Medical Association.

The doctor's suggestion was only one of many put forward in the last two days since Newmarket, where the hospital is situated, rang with rumors that bankruptcy was imminent, and that the bank had ceased to honor hospital cheques.

K.M.R. Stiver, chairman, denied cheques had been stopped and that his hospital could go bankrupt.

"The bank manager was apprehensive about an overdraft of \$45,900," he said, "and our situation is desperate. We have a \$10,000 overdraft at a second bank, and without a money-raising campaign, or increased grants from some level of government, the hospital's losses can't possibly diminish."

"Think of the money—I'll bet it is in the millions—that goes from Canada every year in the Irish Sweepstakes. Those dollars run Irish hospitals. They could run ours," he added.

Unless grants from the surrounding municipalities are forthcoming, Mr. Stiver said, a public drive for funds would have to be considered. He said that a drive for a new 15 to 25 bed addition would be considered, too.

Aid has been recently solicited from Whitechurch and other nearby municipalities, on a basis of patients accommodated from each.

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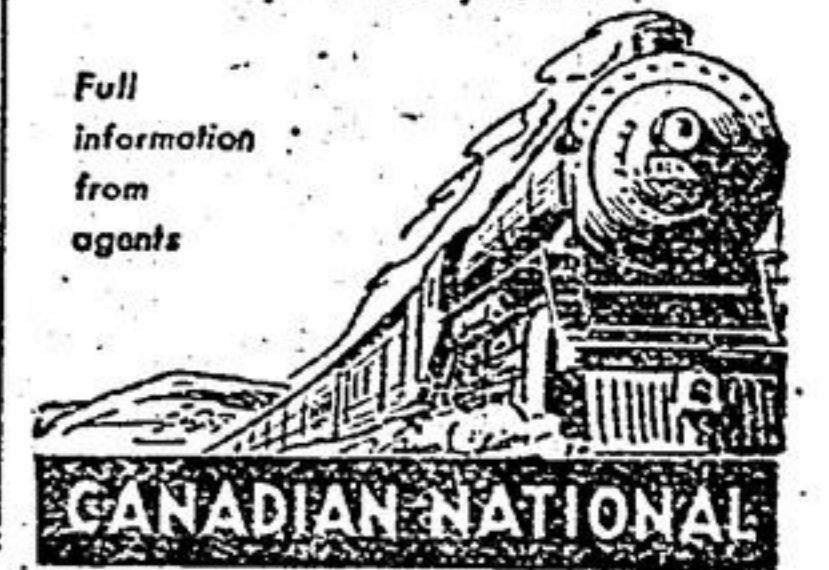
